Principal Harold Welbezahl has announced that a student at And-over Central School has been named a Semifinalist in the 1971-National Merit Scholarship Pro-

gram.

The approximately 15,000 Semifinalists appointed today are among the nation's most intellectually talented high school seniors. They will compete for some 3,000 Merit Scholarships to be awarded in 1972.

The Semifinalists were the high-The Semifinalists were the highest scorers in their states on one National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test 'NMSQT'), which was given last February to more than 555000 students in about 16.600 schools nationwide. They constitute less than one percent of the graduating secondary school sentors in the United States.

The Semificants are represent of the country's most intellectually able, oung people, according to Edward C. Smith, president of the National Merit. Scholarship Corporation (NM 5C).
