Christopher Columbus had one main goal. He wanted to find a short sea route to the Indies (which at that time meant India, China, the East Indies, and Japan) by sailing west. Columbus had a difficult time selling his plan. Finally, Queen Isabella of Spain agreed to support Columbus and his plan. He was given everything he asked for — ships, honors, titles and percentage of trade. "No discoverer was ever promised so much before his performance. No discoverer's performance so greatly exceeded his promise."

On August 3, 1492 Columbus left on his journey. He was accompanied by three ships. They were the Nina, the Pinta and the Santa Maria. Nime days later they reached the Canary Islands. This was the last land that they saw, before reaching what they thought were the Indies.

On October 10, everyone agreed to sail on for three more days and then return if land was not found. On October 12, Columbus landed on the beach at Fernandes Bay, and took possession of a New World (as it proved to be) for Spain. As time went on however, this land proved worthless. There were no riches. Columbus died a poor man. No one realized the value in what he had discovered.

Thirty years later, however, the Old World had a renewal of human sairit. "Columbus had not only discovered a New World, but his success had encouraged other discoveries and opened new windows to science and to all knowledge To few men in modern history does the world as we know it one sogreat a debt as to Christopher Columbus."


