Dear Editor:

In all due fairness to the voters of Allegany County, I feel that statements made by my opponent need to be brought out in the open and clarified.

The Statement: "money has already been appropriated and is presently in the Sheriff's budget to pay for more active involvement of the sheriff's department in local and county wide activities" was made at a recent meeting in Caneadea, by Mr. Michael J. Fiorio Democratic candidate for Sheriff of Allegany County.

This statement is entirely false. I talked with some of the Legislators who are members of the Sheriff's committee and they were as surprised as I was at the statement, because they know of no money appropriated for the expansion of the Sheriff's department.

The chairman of the county Legislators has asked all department heads to hold expenses to a minimum and not instigate any new programs.

The whole country, not just Allegany County has shown a marked increase in crime recently.

How many of the burglaries committed in the past three weeks were in Wellsville, where Mr. Fiorio is the Special Investigator?

At a recent Democrat dinner meeting, Mr. Fiorio said that Sheriff Burdick had not asked for radios.

Since first taking office I have continuously stressed the need for radio communication. I too realize the need for such equipment, but the appropriation for it has to come first.

Mr. Fiorio has taken a strong stand in favor of County Sheriff's Patrols and said they would not be costly. While I am not opposed to road patrols, I feel that because of the expense involved, a referendum should be offered to the taxpayers of Allegany County. Let them make the decision.

Moved by William Dunham and seconded by Glenn Thorp to accept the minutes of the regular meeting held Sept. 13th as read. Carried.

Moved by Glenn Thorp and seconded by William Dunham to accept the minutes of the Special meeting held Sept. 15 as read. Carried.

Moved by Glenn Thorp and seconded by William Dunham to accept the minutes of the Special meeting held September 27 as read. Carried.

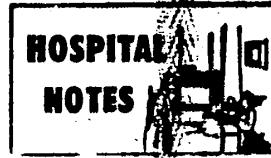

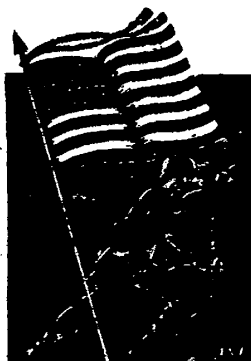

## Alfred U. ROTC Guest Speaker For Veterans' Day

Although the date of the holiday will be different this year, the original meaning of the holiday will take on even greater emphasis. Commander Tuttle of Lynch-Burggett Post No. 397 of The American Legion said in announcing plans for Andover's observance of Veterans Day, October 25.

Formerly observed on November 11 (the anniversary of the armistice that ended World War I), Veterans Day is one of four holidays which were changed to a specific Monday of each year under the provisions of Public Law 90-363 passed by the Congress in 1968 and in effect for the first time this year.

However, Commander Tuttle emphasized that the law had not affected the meaning of the national holiday which was designated by the Congress in 1954 as a holiday in honor of the men and women who have served in the uniform of the United States and dedicated to the attainment of an honorable world peace.

"The citizens of Andover have an opportunity to participate in a greatly needed nationwide expression of unity and pride in our country during this Veterans Day observance," Commander Tuttle declared. "Let's show at this critical hour in the history of our nation and the world that we support the national purpose in the attainment of an honorable world peace."

The observance of Veterans Day in Andover is sponsored by Post No. 397 with the cooperation and assistance of the following organizations: Legion Auxiliary, Andover Central School and Alfred University ROTC.

The parade will form at the Legion Hall and will include the Post 207 Color Guard and the Andover Central School Band. It will proceed to the Legion Park where Sgt. Major Burnett of the Alfred University ROTC will speak briefly honoring all Veterans.

## Red Cross Drive For Andover Ends

The Annual Drive to obtain funds for the American Red Cross ended last Friday, Oct. 15th in the Village of Andover.

The Andover Central School gave \$151.58 with \$90.22 of this amount coming from the children. Winning rooms in the Red Cross Drive were: 1st in the H.
