State legislators — and taxpayers — are going to have enough trouble on their hands unravelling the rhetoric from the facts in what is shaping up as one of the biggest budget battles in years when they get together in January for the 1972 session.

On top of it will be another battle. This one will be between Rocky and New York City Mayor John V. Lindsay, with the latter out to build his image with his newly found Democratic party and the former out to settle old scores. The battleground for this duel will be preservation of the 30-cent subway fare in New York City.

It is going to be one long, angry election-year session.

Rocky is getting ready to move his New York City office into the 110-story World Trade Center early next year. At a cost of some \$14 million a year, the State has agreed to rent 58 entire floors of the huge building, some two million square feet.

The move will consolidate state offices scattered throughout the city into one building.

U. S. Senator James Buckley is at odds with his party over the Governor's \$2.5 billion mass transportation bond issue. The state Conservative party is opposing the

issue, saying the state is already too much in debt.

But Buckley says he will vote for the bond issue, saying he hopes "a way will be found" to finance the debt payments.

The Assembly Ways and Means Committee staff has recommended a number of budget reforms aimed at giving state legislators a clearer picture of the state's financial position every year.

Anything would be an improvement over the present budget document the Governor hands the legislators every year.

For example, the State spends about \$36 million every year on tax anticipation notes — short term bonds floated to pay bills until taxpayers actually send their checks and money orders to the state treasury. But the item is never listed in the budget. Legislators never learn the exact figure until the following year when it comes up in the so-called deficiency budget.

In short, the committee staff wants the Governor to put more details into his budget, and make those details clear enough for everyone to understand.

Lawmakers won't admit it in public, but it is an observable fact that only a handful of legislators really understand the budget. The rest rely on the opinions of these few.

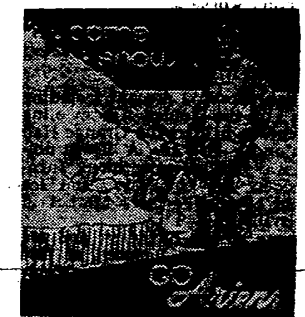
