State legislators — and taxpayers — are going to have enough trouble on their hands unraveling the rhetoric from the facts in what is shaping up as one of the biggest budget battles in years when they get together in January for the 1972 session.

On top of it will be another battle. This one will be between Rocky and New York City Major John V. Lindsay, with the latter out to build his image with his newly found Democratic party and the former out to settle old scores.

The battleground for this owel will be preservation of the 30-cent subway fare in New York City. It is going to be one long, angry election-year session.

Rocky is getting ready to move his New York City office into the 110-story World Trade Center early next year. At a cost of some \$14 million a year the State has agreed to rent 58 entire floors of the huge building, some two million square

feet.
The move will consolidate state offices scattered throughout the city into one building.

U. S. Senator James Buckley is at odds with his party over the Governor's \$2.5 billion mass trans-portation bond issue. The state Conservative party is opposing the
