Rural Carriers Aid In Farm Survey

Rural Carriers out of the Andover Postoffice, and throughout the County are distributing the farmers questionnaires for the 1971 Acreage and Production Survey. Postmaster Rita E. Burns said today.

A joint Federal-State project, this fall survey provides information on acreage and production of major field and vegetable crops harvested in 1971. Information on the number of farmers keeping livestock and poultry is also sought.

Some 23,000 questionnaires are being distributed to farmers thru out New York State. The Post Office and Rural mail carriers provide the contact with farmers for the survey. Rural Carriers leave questionnaires in mail boxes of a cross-section of farmers. Completed questionnaires from New York farmers are forwarded by the Post Office to the Federal-State New York Crop Reporting Service at Albany, New York.

ELECTION COMMENTS

Well Folks, next Tuesday is the day that all good Citizens have the opportunity to express their feelings — in part at least — when they go to the polls and vote for or against, the candidates of their choice and the amendments and propositions on the ballot.

Enclosed in this week's issue of the Andover News, you should find a ballot with everything on it as it will appear in the voting booth, and the other items are printed as a legal notice elsewhere in this week's paper. Look everything over, discuss things with your family, friends — or what have you — make up your minds — and then GET OUT AND VOTE!

Proposition No. 1, the first of 3 questions on the ballot known as the New York State Bond Issue, ask people to vote whether to borrow \$2.5 billion under a bond issue for transportation purposes — both for mass transportation and highways. Around half would be used for the former and the other half for the latter. If the Bond Issue is approved, Federal matching funds for highways would be available for the same amount. If the proposition is defeated, the Federal Funds that are available would be put into a central pool for the use of any State that matched the funds on a FIRST COME — FIRST SERVED BASIS.

Some people ask what happened to the last \$2.5 Billion that was voted on in 1967 so here is a brief synopsis: More than 2,000 miles of highways have been built or rebuilt and thousands of additional miles of highway right-of-way have been improved by landscaping, signing, and new safety features such as improved guide rail. New and improved facilities include the Southern Tier Expressway (Route 17), 72 miles completed since 1967, another 100 miles under construction, and the remaining 52 miles under the planning and design stages; Genesee Expressway from Rochester South thru Dansville, Wayland, and Hornell with several sections now open as well as arterials in the Buffalo and Rochester regions; as well as the completion of Route 81 from the Canadian Border all the way to the Pennsylvania line — together with improvements around just about every major City in the State.

The new Bond Issue would fund the rest of Route 17 Expressway as well as the others mentioned above in our immediate area. Along with the work on these highways would be the employment of many skilled and unskilled laborers to add to our sagging economy.

Thus we recommend a YES VOTE on this issue.

As far as Amendment No. 1 is concerned a great big NO is our vote on this one! We feel that it has a "blank check on your tax dollars" that it would be an invitation to "spend" would give the green light for more Albany Mills; cause the "strangulation of middle income taxpayers"; and pave the road to bankruptcy of state and local government — for a select few in the big cities. We say NO NO NO — thousands and times NO to this one.

For Amendment No. 2 for selfish motive in our own immediate Andover area, we think a YES vote is in line.

In a phone call today to the office of Henry L. Diamond, Commissioner of Environmental Conservation, we were told that "approval of this Amendment No. 2 is vital to the continuation of New York's pioneering effort to clean up its rivers, lakes and streams".

The Amendment would extend to Jan. 1, 1983, the exemption from Constitutional debt the limitations of indebtedness incurred by Municipalities of construction and reconstruction of facilities for the conveniences, treatment and disposal of sewage.

There is no question of the tremendous non-partisan support of the pure water program. Commissioner Diamond stated.
