In Cross-Country action last week, Andover came in third place against Bolivar and Bishop Walsh for the first time this year. The top runner for Andover was Dave Haugh who came in tenth followed by Chad Grossman who placed twelfth. Roger Godown placed thirteenth and Mike Bliss came in sixteenth. Mike Bliss, suffering a cramp in the middle of the race, was delayed. Andover had only four runners.

On Friday, they had their second home meet of the season with Bolivar and Alfred-Almond at Coach Russell's course. Don Lang, back after a week in the hospital, came in eighth setting a school record. Dave Haugh placed eleventh with Chad Grossman coming in a close twelfth. Roger Godown placed fourteenth to round out the Andover runners. Bolivar won the meet as they did the meet on Tuesday.

Mike Bliss is out for the season with a rib injury, with Brian Cannon out for a week or so with a knee problem. Freshman Chris Mattison is also out with an eye injury. He will be sidelined for an indefinite period of time. Andover also took third at this meet.

Soccer

The Andover Panther Soccer Team dropped their first defeat in league action to host Alfred-Almond on Tuesday, October 19. Mike Parker hit on the only goal of the game in the second period. The downfall of the Panthers was injuries. Jim MacMichael our center forward and high scorer was not up to strength due to an ankle injury, and Mike Jackson sprained his ankle in the Wellsville game. He was moved back to full-back instead of his regular center half-back position. Final score was 1-0.

Andover then stood 4 wins and 1 loss in B-C league and 2 wins and 1 loss in the C league. This loss and Fillmore's win over Wellsville made a showdown with Fillmore for the championship of both leagues.

Bryon Cerrillo scored two goals and Dan Davis and Mike Gougenour each had one goal as Andover whipped winless Whitesville 4 to 2. Giving the seniors a rest to recover from injuries, the substitutes did a fine job. Andover's overall record now is at 8-3.

Last Friday night, the Soccer Team traveled to Fillmore for the final game of the regularly scheduled season. This game decided the winner of the "B-C" and "C" League Title. Going into the game Andover and Fillmore were tied with identical 4-1 records in "B-C" League and 2-1 "C" League. In the middle of the first period Jim MacMichael drove home the first goal of the game. Less than five minutes later Jim MacMichael again put in what was to be the final tally for Andover. There was no scoring in the second period. In the third period Fillmore made it a game by scoring early in the third period. Later in fourth quarter Tom MacMichael scored many fine saves to protect our lead. As the final horn sounded, Andover had its first soccer championship since 1969 when we were defeated.

To try the Panthers travel to Wyoming to play the number one team from Seneca-Olean County.
