Mr. and Mrs. William Tuttle of Fremont, were recent dinner guests of Mrs. Pearl Bassett.

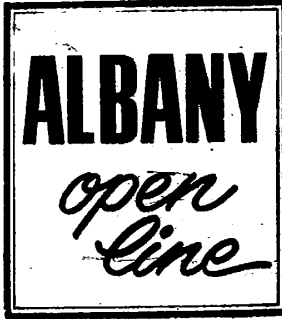
Mrs. M. P. Wheeler visited her niece Wednesday to Friday to see her sister, Mrs. William Hember at Wellsboro, R.D.

UFT is a New York City organization, STA is made up primarily of some 100,000 upstate teachers.

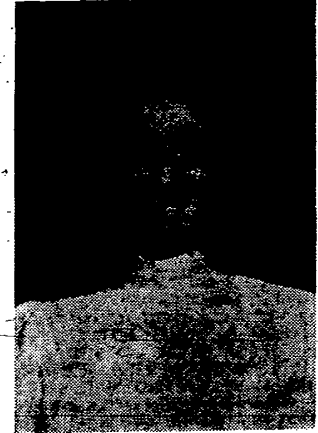
During the past few years Shanker has proved he has more "clout" in the State Capitol than the upstate union. A merger would give him even more.
