A Meet Worthwhile Trip

 Last Thursday our Health Class visited Craig Colony at Sonyea. To me it was a very rewarding experience. Never before had I visited such a place. In fact, I didn't even realize that it existed.
 Craig Colony is an institution primarily for epileptics. But recently they have begun accepting the mentally retarded. It is not a secluded, unsanitary place. In fact it is just the opposite. The institution can be seen from the highway. I've seen it before, but I never realized what it was. The whole place is spotless. The overall picture is beautiful.
 However, the reasons that these people are here are not so beautiful. These people are suffering from conditions that they can't help. The didn't ask to be retarded and they didn't ask to have Epilepsy. As a result of their conditions they are outcasts in society. However, Craig Colony is a society made up of these people. They function, with the help of supervisors, just like any other society would.
 What we need in this country and in this world, is more places like Craig Colony. There are millions of people that are suffering from Epilepsy and that are mentally retarded, who have no place to go. They die neglected and unloved. What we really need though is more people that care.

Exciting New Library Program

The Andover School Library has added an Individual or Autotutorial center to its services.
 Individual study carrels have been set up in the room adjoining the main Library. Each Carrel, which resembles a desk is equipped with individual audiovisual machines for use with filmstrips, records loops, cassettes, and slides. This enables students to work individually at his own pace on materials covered in class. Work sheets accompany the materials. The purpose of the program is to help the student review material he missed in class or to go over material he did not understand. It also enables a student to pursue areas of special interest.
 A new trend in education is the opportunity to earn credit for courses through challenging examinations. This can be done in high school regents courses or for credit for college courses. It is hoped that programs of study can be added as they become available for individuals who wish to study on their own for such examinations. It may even be possible to offer programs for adults who wish to earn college credit.
 The students are showing a serious interest in using the facilities and indicate it helps them.
 Later in the year the Library Council plans to have a visiting day when the public will be invited to see and use the equipment.
