The purchasers at such sale shall pay the amount of their respective bids to the County Treasurer within forty-eight hours after the last day of the sale and receive certificates describing the lands purchased, the sums paid, and the time when the purchasers will be entitled to deeds; subject to the Soldiers and Sailors Civil Relief Act of 1918 and 1940 and the amendments thereto, and after expiration of one year from the last day of such sale, they shall be entitled to receive conveyances of the lands so purchased by them respectively, (or at their option foreclose the lien as provided by law) unless said lands shall have been prevenely accounted to law.
