The state's lawmakers may be going back to work two weeks earlier than anticipated.

The state's senators and assemblymen were scheduled to go to Albany for a special session on December 14 to rubber stamp the mandated reapportionment of their own legislative districts.

Now there is serious speculation Gov. Rockefeller will order them back as early as December 1 to tackle the problem of a state deficit that totals nearly \$800 million.

The haste is understandable. The \$800 million deficit is in the current fiscal year, which ends March 31, 1972.

They would like to have that problem out of the way before they tackle the fiscal problem of what to do about the next budget, the one for the fiscal year beginning April 1, 1972.

The big question of course is how.

Keep in mind that the ball game is being played with hundreds of millions of dollars, not just hundreds of thousands.

The biggest expense item in state government is salaries. Earlier this year 8,000 state employees lost their jobs in the austerity drive. The Civil Service Employees Association almost went on strike. If more state employees are fired next year, the situation could get worse.

The Governor has already suggested that state aid to education will have to be cut.

But that solution, for example, is not going to go over well with many legislators and particularly those from Long Island. The Long Island delegation, by the way, can block any plans in the Assembly to cut aid to schools.

Another solution is tax hikes. The state sales tax, because it was already hiked once this year, is probably immune.

But the others are all alive. They include hikes in the income tax, cigarette, beer, liquor taxes, and a wide variety of licenses and fees for everything from snowmobiles to medical licenses.


