D. Lynn Redmond 28, administrator of freshmen admissions at Alfred University has been named Director of Admissions at Wayland Academy, Beaver Dam, Wis. James R. Burnham, President of the Academy noted the recent appointment. Mr. Redmond has responsibility for Wayland's program of student recruitment throughout the United States. The Academy now enrolls students from 17 states and 5 foreign countries, about equally divided between boys and girls in grades 7 - 12.

A native of Greenwood, Mr. Redmond is a Political Science graduate of Allegheny College, Pa. He earned a Master's Degree in Education and Counseling from Alfred and did additional graduate work at Brockport, Cortland and Cornell University.

Wayland Academy is an independent, co-educational college preparatory boarding school with 270 pupils. It is in its 119th year, the oldest co-educational secondary boarding school in the Midwest.

United States District Court Judge Harold P. Burke has dismissed complaints against Gary Moore, Principal, and Greenwood Central School Board in the Candy Babcock case. Miss Babcock's attorney for the American Civil Liberties Union with Faith Seidenberry of Syracuse and Greenwood Principal and Board by Edward Degnan of Canastota.

Candy, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Leon Babcock, complained she had been denied by reason of sex development and participation in boy's interscholastic activities. She requested this of the Board Nov. 12, 1973. The Board first granted her request but reversed the decision later on recommendation of the New York State Public High School Association. The Board also received a letter from George Grover, Director of the Division of Physical Education and Recreation of the State Education Department, that it had been in violation in approving her request to try out for the team.

Commissioner Nyquist ruled in May 1973 that there shall be no mixed competition in any major sport. Judge Burke in his decision, ruled there is no claim in the complaint at Moore as Principal of the Greenwood Central School has discriminated against Babcock and members of her class. The complaint is dismissed against the Greenwood Central School Board on the grounds that the Board is not a person. The Babcock case and two or three others are test cases being brought in the State to permit girls to participate in boys interscholastic events.
