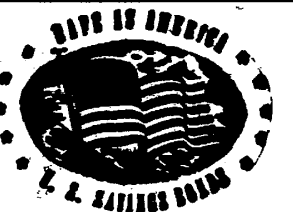

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Lindy's Memory Lives On



Shortly after his historic flight, Charles Lindbergh took Henry Ford up in the "Spirit of St. Louis" for his first airplane ride and sparked the auto maker's interest in aviation. At that time, Ford was planning his American history museum in Dearborn, Michigan which now houses a wealth of Lindbergh memorabilia, including this photograph.

Aviation history was made in May, 1927, when Charles A. Lindbergh flew the "Spirit of St. Louis" non-stop from New York to Paris. A cheering crowd of 100,000 greeted Lucky Lindy as he stepped from the plane at Le Bourget airport after the grueling 33½-hour flight.

Now, the Lone Eagle is gone, but his greatness lives on in the courage he displayed that spring in Paris. And it lives in the tangible articles of his life which he left behind. Many of these are preserved at the Henry Ford Museum in Dearborn, Michigan.

For his solo transatlantic flight, Lindbergh accepted only the duty-earned \$25,000 prize and one other gift—a Franklin Airman Sedan, America's only automobile of the day with an air-cooled engine, the car served Lindbergh well from his first date with Anne Morrow through several years of their marriage. He gave it to the Henry Ford Museum in 1940 where it has been displayed ever since. An exact duplicate of the original "Spirit of St. Louis" used in the movie starring Jimmy Stewart also is on display at the Museum.

Lindbergh was more than an aviator pioneer. His friendship with Henry Ford led to some land pioneering as well. While a consultant at the Ford Willow Run Bomber

Plant in 1942, Lindbergh expressed an interest in the still-novel travel trailers. Soon after, Ford presented him with the 1935 Stage Coach Trailer that had been on display at the Henry Ford Museum. Lindbergh returned the trailer to the Museum collections in 1957 after many miles of travel. A personal log of the Lindbergh family's trips in 38 states is written on the bottom of the trailer's bureau drawers.

To Lindy himself, the most nostalgic of the Lindbergh items in the collections was the 1911 Excelsior motorcycle he bought and rode while still in college. After seeing a photograph of the restored vehicle, he remarked that to see the motorcycle as it was in his youth was like taking him back in a time machine.

Americans will not soon forget Charles Lindbergh. The legendary daredevil is dead, but his memory lives in the articles he prized—now part of the collections of the Henry Ford Museum.
