Winter Muskellunge Season Underway

Another winter muskellunge season is underway on Chautauqua Lake in south-western New York giving fishermen an opportunity to take New York's biggest game fish through the ice.

The Department of Environmental Conservation said that the 1975 winter musky season is open on Chautauqua Lake every Saturday and Sunday during January and February. The dates are January 11 and 12, 18 and 19, 25 and 26, February 1 and 2, 8 and 9, 15 and 16, 22 and 23. The extended season was authorized by the Legislature after biological data collected by the Department indicated that the low rate of angler success in the winter seasons did not place undue pressure on the muskellunge population.

In addition to their 1974-75 fishing licenses anglers must also purchase a special muskellunge license for \$1. These are available from county, village and city clerks in Cattaraugus, Chautauqua and Erie Counties.

The special muskellunge license permits an angler to take a maximum of one legal fish per day and five per season. Legal muskies must be 30 inches or longer. Fish taken during the winter season, of course, count toward an angler's season limit of five fish. All muskies taken must be immediately tagged with the seals provided and reported to the Department as indicated on the license.

Muskellunge may be taken only by angling; no tip-ups may be used. The use of metal lines or metal leaders in excess of six feet is prohibited. While fishing for muskellunge, however, anglers will no doubt encounter two other popular and tasty winter fish — yellow perch and walleye.

Although chances of taking a muskellunge through the ice are not good, the challenge appeals to hardy anglers for whom the muskie offers the top thrill.

Veterans News

LISTEN VETERAN

INSURANCE FOR GUARDSMEN

Former members of the National Guard with 20 years of creditable service are now eligible for low-cost group life insurance. Under the Veterans Insurance Act of 1974 these Guardsmen may apply for Servicemen's Group Life Insurance if they have not yet reached age 60. Premium rates for \$20,000 coverage are \$6 per month through age 39; \$8 per month, 40 through 49 years of age; and \$10 per month, 50 years and over. Eligibility expires automatically when the insured receives his first retirement check, which comes shortly after the 60th birthday of the retiree.

CHANGE OF ADDRESS — IMPORTANT

Veterans and their dependents receiving compensation, pension, or other VA benefit checks should report any change of address, as soon as possible, to the VA. Failure to do so could cause considerable delay in receipt of the benefit checks at a time when they may be needed most. Both the VA and the local Post Office should be notified of any address change to insure delivery of the checks to the new address with a minimum of delay. Veterans and their dependents are advised to visit the local counseling center of the New York State Division of Veterans' Affairs located at the Municipal Bldg., Wellsville, N. Y. on Tuesdays, and at the City Bldg., Hornell, N. Y., on Mondays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays where change of address forms are available.
