Make Your Own Terrarium

H-you like to keep your green terrarium can be your own mini-ature greenhouse. It's a tury way for children to learn about plants, and terrariums are easy to make and to maintain.

Easy-to-follow instructions are given in a new Johnny Horizon sheet fact called Make Your Own Terrarium. A free copy may be had from Consumer Information,

The tips on how to make your own terrarium include advice on: Container — Use clear glass

Own terrarium include advice on:
Container — Use clear glass containers, (not green or brown, they obscure the light) that can be sealed to insure proper moisture for the growing plants.
Gravel and Charcoal — Cover the bottom of the container with at least one inch of moist gravel in which you've mixed places of activated sharcoal.

Soil — For a woodsy plant, use rich soil taken from where the plants are found. A household plant needs a soil mixture of egish parts of garden soil and send. If you're planting cactus, you'll need a mostly sandy soil and more sulight.

Plans — You can use moss and lichens for ground cover or even gravel of different colors. Then add clover, ferns, native plants,

gravel of different colors. Head add clover, ferns, native plants, wild flowers and ivy.

Water — One you've put the plants in the soil, sprinkle or spray them with tepid water and cover the terranium with a place of glass. Remember to keep a moist, but not a source atmostwhere for
