The Mayor's Column

Trustees Mike Brace, Avery Mead and Paul Hyland and myself attended a meeting of the Towns and Villages using the Wellsville landfill on Snyder Road. Mayor Gardner of Wellsville called the meeting to discuss a report prepared by a municipal consultant of the operating expenses for the landfill since it started in 1970. A second purpose was to compare the present and future operations at Snyder Road with the County's Solid Waste Disposal proposal.

According to the analysis of the present landfill operation, the amount we have been contributing is less than our portion of the actual costs. While we have been billed at a \$2.50 per capita rate, the actual rate according to expenditures should be \$3.51 per capita for 1974-75. In as much as our present contract expires at the end of this fiscal year (May 31, 1975), we will have to renegotiate the contract and it is estimated the rate could be \$3.80 per capita for 1975-76. Whether or not the County landfill goes through we still would probably need to use Wellsville's landfill for another year at least.

The County's proposed landfill program figures out to be 2.17 per capita per year based on 1.91 /k assessed value. If, as Chairman Hale has indicated, the County will use Federal Revenue Sharing for start-up costs (purchase and preparation of site and equipment) this per capita figure drops to \$1.43 based on a \$1.23/k evaluation.

The Village Board expects to discuss this issue further at the regular Board Meeting Monday night at 7:30 at the Village Office.

The new school will offer one two, and three year diploma courses under the Evangelical Teacher Training Association of Wheaton, Illinois. Also a four-year Bachelor program will be offered, with the degree being presented by the Berean Christian College through the regents of Trinity Institute.

The institute will share facilities with community churches until all adequate facility may be purchased. Applications for the spring and fall semesters are now being received. Anyone interested in applying should write to the Institute, Andover, N. Y. 14806.
