The National Farmer Organization (NFO) held a meeting at the Greenwood Town Hall, Wednesday afternoon. Support is growing in Steuben County for a collection, dispatch and delivery program of the NFO. About fifteen farmers have begun marketing their milk through the program. The first milk under the program was shipped last Friday and a truck and driver has been hired to pick up milk from participating farmers three days a week.

Wednesday the program was explained to a group of about twenty Greenwood area farmers by Randy Brown, dairy representative for NFO. He has held similar meetings in Troupsburg, Bath, Wells, Scio and Rushford. The total effort nationwide is "Think 30" he said. He explained that the collection, dispatch and delivery system is a nationwide effort to market 30 per cent of the meat, milk and grain produced by the County's farmers.

The nationwide approach gives farmers in each area of the county more bargaining power through NFO which is organized under the Capper-Volstead Act and which serves as a bargaining agency for the farmer member. Under the supplemental agreement made by members to participate in the milk program there is a 30 day-as-you-go policy. He said NFO doesn't borrow money to pay the blend price. There is a marketing expense deduction and farmers receive the price for which their milk is sold less this deduction. An effective national marketing program for milk can assure a general price level for dairymen in all parts of the country.

Under the NFO program the class II price from the Minnesota-Wisconsin order sets the price for milk shipped by members across the nation. Brown said this M-W Class II price (Class II is the milk used in powder, cheese and other manufactured products) is also used in determining the blend price in Order 2, the New York-New Jersey Milk Shed.

He said farmers from all age groups are attending the informational meetings he has been holding. They are concerned. They are looking for an alternative to the old milk marketing structures. He feels that the NFO collection, dispatch and delivery system where farmers sell their own milk provides a constructive marketing procedure that enables them to get a return on their production costs.

I was pleased that Lieutenant Governor Krupsak indicated that the Carey administration would support the early and speedy completion of the Expressway west of Olean, and I can only hope that this will not be one more broken promise to the people of this area. However, it is a bit unusual that Ms. Krupsak shared in the glory of the completion of this project. As a member of the State Legislature, for three out of the last four years she voted against the Capital Construction funds in the state budget which make the construction possible. Sometimes politics has it ironies.

The more I look at the 800-page Carey budget, the more I find that it's bad news for residents of the 136th Assembly District. If you and your family enjoy entering the competitions of various kinds at the county fair, you'll be interested to know that the Governor plans to cut state assistance to fair premiums in half starting next year. That will mean, for instance, that the fairs in Allegany, Livingston, and Ontario counties which now receive \$8,700 in state reimbursements for premiums, will get only \$4,300 each starting in 1976. That may not seem like much, but when you're being asked to pay 10 cents per gallon more for gas and the new Administration wants to spend \$10 Million in New York City to inspect vehicle exhausts, it's plenty!

In another area of the budget, the Governor recommends cutting \$250,000 for tourism promotion in this State. In my column of last week, I mentioned that New York State already spends far less on tourist advertising and promotion than most major tourist areas in North America. Little did I realize then that the budget would reveal the cutting of funds even further.

It was only last year that the Legislature authorized the expenditure of this \$250,000 because we know, in the long run, the return would be much greater and that tourism means jobs and business for many of our smaller communities. I know that those upstate

BUCKLEY

I hear that you are against public service employment programs. How do you expect the unemployed to get jobs?

R. V.—Rochester

Too many public service jobs involve unproductive 'make work' projects. I believe we ought to channel these funds to more constructive kinds of work. For example, I have proposed a project to repair and upgrade the nation's railroad track beds. This program would not only give many needed jobs to unskilled laborers, but would lead to increased use of the railroads, and would facilitate the transport of coal as the nation's mines expand their production.

You recently brought a law suit against the new Campaign Reform Act of 1974. Are you against reform?

S. L.—Manhattan

Not at all. I am for reform, but I am also for the Constitution. Former Senator Eugene McCarthy, the New York Civil Liberties Union and I have filed a suit challenging several provisions of this law which we believe are unconstitutional. Among the targets of our suit is a provision, for example, which limits the amount a citizen can spend in support of a potential candidate. Many citizens, who have neither the time nor the ability to contribute their services to a political campaign, rely on financial contributions or the placement of ads in newspapers or on the air to express their strongly held political opinions. To place an arbitrarily low limit on their contributions would effectively limit their ability to participate in the political process, and would therefore seriously constrict their constitutional right to freedom of expression.

Is there anything we can do to forestall a Communist takeover in South Vietnam?

J. O.—East Aurora

Yes, we could live up to our pledges in the Paris accords. At that time we agreed to replace military hardware and ammunition as it was used up by the South Vietnamese. But, while the Communists have amply supplied the North Vietnamese, the Congress has sharply cut back on the flow of arms to the South. Before the South Vietnamese are allowed to die a slow death, I would hope that Congress would vote to honor this nation's commitment to supply an ally with the arms needed for its survival.

legislators who are very much concerned with bringing in more tourists in the next few years will fight to have those funds restored. It seems a foolish time to cut funds when we plan the Olympics in Lake Placid in a few short years and next year hundreds of thousands from all over the world will pass through the state on their way to the Summer Olympics in Montreal.

Despite all the wrangling over the budget and other matters, we are moving along in the Assembly — even if ever so slowly. One of the first pieces of major legislation was passed on Feb. 5 which repeals the section of the law exempting women from jury duty and has been signed into law by the Governor. There was little choice in this matter, since the United States Supreme Court ruled that this exemption, taken by some states, was unconstitutional. Thus New York is merely conforming to action being taken in those other states where women were automatically exempt.

One section of the new law facilitates the granting of excuses and postponements by allowing prospective jurors for whom jury service would be hardship including the parents of young children, to apply for an excuse of postponement by mail rather than by personal appearance in open court. It is expected that we have not heard the end of this situation. It is expected that legislation will be introduced, as in former years as a juror reform bill which will spell out standards for excusing those changed with the care of young children.
