

Legislator Lee Ryan Reports

ALMOND — The district meetings for the Allegany County Solid Waste proposal have been held, our committee anxiously waits the decisions by the towns and villages.

As a whole, I was satisfied with the meetings. I think the officials of both towns and villages now understand the proposal and will respond with their best judgement.

To those who might be critical of our committee for wanting to push forward with the soils investigation, land survey and topographic mapping proposal at the January 27 meeting of the Board of Legislators, I can only say that our committee was charged with a job to do by the full Board and we are trying our best against difficult odds to do it. We hope to complete our work so that the full Board can act on it by the first of April. Meantime a lot of things have to be accomplished. The two items that I just mentioned, extension of the Warner option from February 15 to April 1, Department of Environmental Conservation approval of the landfill site and also the whole plan, not to mention a few trips back to Ways and Means for authorization to proceed.

The first three meetings, District I, II, and III, we projected costs on a per capita basis not using revenue sharing funds. Our committee decided that the citizens of Allegany County could equate costs better on a dollar per thousand of assessed valuation than on a per capita basis. So the following table will show the costs to the towns in Allegany County based on the equalized value at the rate of \$1.26 per thousand of assessed value. This would be operating costs per year:

An example of how this would affect the average homeowner if their town were assessing at the county average of 35% would be as follows:

Assessed value of property	\$3,000
Rate per thousand	x \$1.26
Equals cost of solid waste disposal	\$3.78 per year

Charles Gaynor, who is one of the collector landfill operators for the Alfred-Almond area called me last night. He told me that he had quite a few calls asking if he were going out of the collection business. It seems that some of the people are confused on the clean and green and 40 cubic yard containers.

It may help if I clarify this point. The plan calls for the big boxes (40 cu yd) to be located in five different parts of the county. One of these located between Alfred and Almond would primarily be for people who DO NOT have curbside collection services of Mr. Gaynor or Mr. Patton. However, anyone can self-haul to one of these boxes if he so desires. The same is true of the six cu. yd. clean and green boxes.

Charles also told me that he would like to be out of the landfill business. He stated that he spends too much of his income on the landfill operations. This is also true with most of the other collector landfill operators in the County.

Dr. Ronald A. Cushman Appointed Director Of Cooperative Education

Dr. Ronald A. Cushman, associate professor of retailing and marketing, has been appointed Director of Cooperative Education at State Agricultural and Technical College at Alfred.

Dr. David H. Huntington, college president, said college-wide coordination of a comprehensive program in cooperative education will be possible through a federal grant of \$18,000.

The grant, for a six-month period ending June 30, was received under provisions of the Vocational Education Act, according to Dr. Huntington. Approval of the funds came from the State Education Department's Bureau of Two-Year College Programs and Division of Occupational Supervision.

Dr. Cushman, a member of the Alfred faculty since 1967, has been directly involved with the cooperative education program which the college currently offers in its Retail Business Management curriculum.

Under this program students combine course study on campus with at least one eight-week segment of actual work experience off campus. This experience is provided through the cooperation of retailers within a 150-mile radius of the college.
