"Inside The State Capital"

As the various hearings on the proposed 1975-76 State Budget of Governor Carey are held, it becomes even more evident that upstate areas stand to lose tremendously if some of the Governor's plans are adopted. Last week, for instance, the Assembly Ways and Means and Senate Finance Committees held a joint hearing on the educational aspects of the budget which left no doubt that the Carey plan to change public school aid formulas from an attendance to enrollment basis would be disastrous for all school districts in this area.

The State Education Commissioner, Ewald Nyquist, stated at that meeting that per pupil state aid based on enrollment would greatly help big city schools, especially those in New York City. He also revealed that it would take about \$300,000,000 to make the transition. That money has to come from somewhere. It is doubtful that it would be added to the present budget proposal which actually cuts aid to education. And if it is adjusted from the per pupil aid formula as it stands now, there is no question that it will have to hurt the smaller schools such as the ones in Allegany, Livingston and Ontario counties.

One of the unjust things about this Democratic plan which ties aid to enrollment rather than daily attendance is that it is a further blow to the very schools who are doing the best job of educating students while 'rewarding' schools where truancy runs rampant and, in effect, giving taxpayers' dollars to students from big cities who are seldom, if ever, in school. I intend to do everything in my power to see that the aid formula stays as it is today. There is no need for this change and, in the long run, it would help no one — not even New York City schools because their problem with truancy and discipline would become even worse.

More broken promises? Governor Carey said during the campaign that he would take a 10 percent cut in his \$85,000 annual pay in order to 'lead the way' in cutting state government expenses. He urged his staff members earning beyond a certain means to do the same. Then several weeks ago the Governor announced that he would have to 'delay' his cut until April in order to meet the pressing expenses of his daughter's recent wedding.

Now the New York Daily News reports that apparently none of his aides has yet seen fit to take a pay cut. Their salaries generally range in the mid-thirty thousands to mid-twenty thousand dollar category with the stop salary at \$47,000. Maybe they're waiting for a lead from their boss.

Meanwhile, figures from the payroll of Lieutenant Governor Krupsak show that she will spend about \$558,000 this year on staff over double what her predecessor, former Governor Malcolm Wilson spent. No word yet whether any of these people plan pay 'cuts'.

It's remarkable how those pronouncements on the floor of the Legislature come back to haunt you. Last year in the Assembly we had a rather extensive debate over my bill denying welfare benefits to illegal aliens. Fortunately for the residents of this State, the bill was passed and signed into law by Governor Wilson.

However, many of us can remember that howls of denial from New York City Democrats that there are not nearly as many illegal aliens in New York City as we had estimated there were. Now comes The Daily News again, after an eye-opening series it did on illegal aliens. It revealed there are over 1.5 million illegal aliens in that City and they are working at about 120,000 jobs. In these days of recession, could we use 100,000 jobs? It's not necessarily our desire to throw these people out of work or out of the country, but it is hard to explain this situation to the thousands of New Yorkers unemployed right now.
