Mrs. Florence Moore reports that her son, Glenn Moore was honored recently. The Webster-Fairport Elks Lodge held their Fifth Annual Policeman-Fireman Recognition Dinner February 6. Mr. Moore, a State Trooper, was acclaimed for meritorious service to the area since his assignment to the State Police Station at Williamson, N. Y., December 1968.

He was born in Hornell and raised in Greenwood. He attended Alfred Ag-Tech in Alfred, prior to enlisting in the U. S. Army in Military Police in 1964. While serving at Fort Sill, Oklahoma, he also attended Cameron State College in Lawton, Okla. He entered the New York State Police Academy in May 1968 and was assigned to the Williamson Post in December.

The Award and a Plaque were presented to him crediting him with saving the life of a sky diver who missed a landing mark during a winter carnival near Sodus. The diver parachuted into Lake Ontario. Moore swam out to the man and pulled him to shore before the rescue craft and firemen could reach the scene. Glenn was also cited for his work with children, elderly and needy. Moore returned the prize money to the Elks for their project of Mobile Therapy Units for home care of Cerebral Palsied children. Mr. Moore lives at Ontario with his wife, Cynthia, and their two children Teresa 6 and Stephen 4.

The School Board voted to enter into the A Study with J. David Rossi, Associate Ltd., of Chautauqua, N. Y. It will begin soon and will involve 250 to 300 people of the community as well as the high school students and staff of the entire school District. It will involve background analysis, financial trends, program accountability, County Population trends, facility evaluations and school organizations. Many sources will be used and it is hoped everyone will take part when invited to participate.

At the February meeting the Board authorized going to a referendum for continued improvement to our building. School renovations include heat controls, electrical wiring, updating restrooms in the 1936 portion of the building also possibly the Gym floor and other things in the Gym. Ventilation in the Gym and Stage area and new aluminum windows on the front of the building. The architects are working on the project. A March 28 public vote on authorizing using the money, \$40,000 in the building reserve fund and giving the Board the right to proceed with the construction project. There will be a public hearing before the vote.
