James H. Waufle Completes 15-day Course

James H. Waufle, Installer/Repairman for the Iroquois Telephone Corporation Alfred Station New York, has completed a course in the fundamentals of key telephone systems. The fifteen-day course was held at the Continental Telephone System Training Center, Dulles International Airport, Washington, D. C.

The course is a study of the circuitry, installation, wiring and repair of key telephone systems. A key system is an electro-mechanical switching system into which a number of separate telephone lines can be connected. In this way, one operator can answer a number of incoming lines.

The course puts particular emphasis on having the trainee install and rectify troubles on working key systems. The instructor increases the amount and complexities of the troubles so that each student's knowledge of the equipment is similarly increased.

Condition Your Air—Winter And Summer

Air conditioning in the Winter?

Yes—but not in the usual sense. Just as you remove moisture from the air in the summer with air conditioning to avoid the discomforts of muggy days, you also can add moisture in the winter to avoid the discomforts of too-low humidity.

Among the most common problems caused by low humidity are static electricity shocks, said Jane Butel Silver, manager of General Electric's Consumers Institute. "But bone-dry winter air can cause other, more costly problems, too.

"For instance, expensive or antique furniture can come unglued in a very dry environment, necessitating costly repairs. Parched air may also dry out nose, throat and sinus tissues, which can contribute to personal discomfort for you and your children," she added.

You can avoid being zapped all winter by unexpected static electricity shocks as well as the other discomforts of low humidity by the easy and relatively inexpensive addition of a power humidifier to a forced-air furnace.

Proper humidity may result in reduced heating bills, too,

Mrs. Silver observes, because moisture in the air makes you tend to feel warmer at lower temperatures.

Another device which works with your furnace and can help improve comfort year-round is the electronic air cleaner.

"A single cubic foot of air in your home may contain millions of particles of dust, dirt, ash, pollen, and mold spores, which a standard furnace filter cannot remove from the air," she explained.

Electronic air cleaners generally are designed to trap nearly all particles down to as small as 1 micron in size and 50% of those particles down to one-hundredth of a micron.

By comparison, human hair averages about 50 microns in diameter. Pollen ranges from 10 to 100 microns in size and most mold spores from 10 to 30 microns. Electronic air cleaners are even effective in helping eliminate tiny pollutants such as cigarette, cigar, or pipe smoke particles, most of which are from .01 to 1 micron in size.

Winter and summer, clean, conditioned air can help make your home a more comfortable place to live.
