Robert J. Golden New Owner of The Historic Belhurst Castle At Geneva

Historic Belhurst Castle at Geneva, N. Y., will get a new owner next week — the fourth in its 84 year history as a showplace and supper club on the shore of Seneca Lake.

He is Robert J. Golden of Big Flats, N. Y., a Corning businessman, who says he will continue to operate the landmark as an eating establishment.

Golden is purchasing the 32-room castle and its 30 acre grounds from Cornelius J. Dwyer, who has owned it since 1933. The turreted Medina stone castle was built by Mrs. Carrie Harron Collins, who moved in in 1891, four years after construction began. On her death in 1926 the property passed to a son, Hal Harron, Jr., who subsequently sold it to Dwyer.

Golden said that he plans to make some interior decorating improvements, but he indicated that what is done "will be done solely to enhance the beauty of what is already one of the outstanding examples of Romanesque architecture in the east. We intend to preserve the integrity of the structure."

He said he will take over active operation of the restaurant on receipt of the state liquor license.

Historical records show that the castle was constructed at a cost of \$65,000. Most of the materials were imported from Europe. It was designed by Albert Fuller, one of the outstanding architects of the United States in the latter part of the nineteenth century.

Golden is president of Eckert Drug Store in Corning, where he has been in business for the past 19 years. He will continue to be responsible for general management of the pharmacy.

Golden presently resides at 42 Downing Street in Big Flats. He plans to sell his home there and move his family this summer to the living quarters on the upper floors of Belhurst.
