6. We are contributing to Senior Citizens recreational programs.
7. We were the first Community in Allegany County to qualify for the National Flood Insurance Program using a building permit system as opposed to zoning. (Incidentally, our plan has been copied by surrounding communities to qualify for National Flood Insurance).
8. We have been able to deposit Village Income (taxes, state aid) in such a manner as to earn interest amounting to better than \$2,000 over the past two years.
9. Put a School Crossing Guard at the corner of Main and Elm Sts.
