A motion to amend the complaint against the Greenwood School Board on behalf of Candy Babcock was presented by attorneys from the American Civil Liberties Union before District Court Judge Edward Burke last Monday. The amending motion would name each of the five members of the Board of Education individually instead of in action against the Board as a group. Judge Burke is expected to make a ruling soon. His decision could re-open the case against the Board. Edward Dignan of Canisteo, attorney for the Board, opposed the action. He said Judge Burke had dismissed the original action against the Board and Superintendent, Principal, Gary Moore. To uphold the action against the Board, Superintendent, Principal, Gary Moore, and Candy Babcock, a junior in Greenwood Central School and the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Leno Babcock, complained that she was denied because of her sex, equal opportunity for athletic development and participation in boys in scholastic sports. The Board in November 1973 at first granted her request but reversed its decision later on the recommendation of the New York State Public School Association. Nyquist ruled in May 1973 there shall be no mixed competition in baseball, basketball, field hockey, football, ice hockey, lacrosse, hand ball, form, volleyball and wrestling. Dec. 31 Judge Burke dismissed the complaint against the Greenwood Board of Education on the grounds the Board is not a person within the contemplation of the law. Judge Burke also dismissed the complaint against Gary Moore in that nowhere in the complaint was Moore referred to except in the "Prayer for relief". He denied the motion to dismiss Nyquist's ruling there was no jurisdictional basis for a suit. A three-judge court is to be named to hear this action.

Principal Glenn E. Bretsch, who has been Andover Principal for the past eleven years, has been elected Supervising Principal at Addison, where a Centralization of forty-one districts is in progress and it is expected that a new central school will be established there during the coming year which will be one of the largest Centralizations in New York State, having a pupil population of from 500 to 1,000 students. Principal Bretsch came to Andover in 1934 as Principal of Old Union Five School District. During the next four years he was instrumental in working out the details of the Central School District which was established in September 1938. He has been Principal of Andover Central School since its organization and has in a great measure been responsible for the expanding of the school program to include all the modern courses of study. Under Principal Bretsch's leadership the local school staff has been increased from 17 to 25 teachers and a modern \$371,000 school building designed and built. Their many Andover friends regret that Mr. and Mrs. Bretsch are leaving our community and wish them continued success in their future endeavor.
