Greenwood Central School To Be Studied

The Greenwood Central School Board of Education retained J. David Rossi Associates, Ltd. of Chautauque, New York to provide the school district with a comprehensive survey and future direction the school may consider in their quest to provide and assure the community of quality educational opportunities for each child.

The Director of Educational Planning is J. David Rossi who will direct and coordinate the survey activities. Mr. Rossi has had extensive experience in all phases of public education. His undergraduate work was completed at Allegany, Muskegon and Wooster Colleges. Graduate work was completed at the Universities of Pittsburgh and Cornell.

Mr. Rossi's experience includes many years in service as a teacher, supervisor, and administrator, prior to his appointment to the post of Secondary Education for the State Department of Education State of Ohio. Mr. Rossi's responsibilities as State Supervisor included school programs, staff and facility evaluations, presenting inservice Education programs on new techniques of program and instruction, chartering School Districts, and implementing School District re-organization.

In his position as School Planner, Mr. Rossi has presented seminars to school administrators in summer workshops at Hiram and Wooster Colleges in addition to a workshop of the 88 Ohio County Superintendents in Columbus, Ohio and over 115 individual school workshops in "Meeting Individual Differences of Students".

The unique cooperative planning activities will involve parents, staff and students working in concert with Mr. Rossi to study and determine the needs of the school district.

Areas of survey activities may include:

1. Facilities analysis — to include educational, mechanical, and instructional data.
2. Program and analysis — to include offerings — success and failure rates.
3. Staff input — to include needs and concerns.
4. Students input — to include specific needs and concerns.
5. Community input — to include citizens in planning and achieving of knowledge of needs and directions.
6. Development of options and directions to be considered based on input data, resources, enrollments and established trends.
7. Feedback sessions to community to determine reactions to the Board of Education.
8. Finalizing options and directions for presentation to the Board of Education.

The Cooperative Planning Survey is scheduled to be completed by the end of June 1975.

Citizen Input Meetings are scheduled for April 8 and April 9 with three meetings being held each day.

Initiations to the Community are being sent out to arrange these meetings which are most important to the success of this study.
