The school study being conducted by Rossi Associates is gaining momentum to get the community involved. After the input meeting in April everyone will be invited back to the feedback meetings to be given the results of the first sessions. The study looks at background analysis and comes up with a finalized community plan.

The work planned will cost \$160,000, but our share will be about \$40,000. Tom Harkenrider was named chairman of the meeting. "Inside The State Capital"

As one legislator so aptly put it, "we should be known as the house of vampires because we lie dormant all day and at night rise up and suck the blood of taxpayers." As I pointed out in an earlier column, this usually occurs on a Tuesday night and this past Tuesday was no different. We were confronted with the Carey Budget which slashed many programs vital to upstate New York while funneling more aid to the urban areas.

Out of each program, as aid to Education, a 50% reduction, no increase in health aid, no funds for housing programs — a program vital to upstate counties and particularly the Finger Lakes area, cuts in State University which provide education to upstate students with no cuts being made to the City University where, incidentally, students attend tuition free. Republican amendments were offered but were defeated by the Democrat majority on these proposals. It is my contention, and that of others that there are sufficient revenues within the framework of our tax laws to provide funds for these needed programs. Instead, the Democrat majority, following the lead of Governor Carey, gave another \$20 million to the failing Urban Development Corporation and a \$100 million subsidy program for New York City to keep the fare at \$.35.

It is further my contention that this budget does not properly address itself to priorities to meet the needs of the people of this State.

On top of all this, the Democrat majority passed a \$350 million tax package which was endorsed by Governor Carey, the same person who on many occasions said "I say as Governor, taxes are going to stop going up. They will not rise under a Carey Administration."

The Senate did not pass tax increases and I am hopeful they will stick to their position. The taxes passed by the Democrats will add fuel to the fire for hard pressed businesses in our State and I am sure they will begin again to flee from our State to other States who work with and entice New York industries. It is true that these taxes do not affect the individual taxpayer but when an industry closes or moves the individual taxpayer no longer has a job. Then what? Unemployment and/or welfare? This is not a proper approach at a time when everyone is attempting to establish and provide more job opportunities.

Again our figures show enough growth under our existing tax structure to fund this budget. These figures have not been refuted and even the Comptroller of the State of New York has confirmed many of our estimates.
