Allegany Co. Y.M.C.A. Offers Spring Courses

Farmers Warned On Buying Scheme

State Agriculture Commissioner Frank Walkley has urged all farmers, particularly those in southwestern New York counties to be particularly alert to offered contracts allowing cut price purchases of farm machinery.

The commissioner noted he has learned from Pennsylvania agricultural officials that an Ohio firm had started solicitations in Chautauque County and may now be soliciting elsewhere in New York State.

The firm offers farmers a membership contract for a fee of \$289. For this fee the firm proposes to purchase farm equipment and supplies for the member at greatly reduced prices.

Commissioner Walkley warned all farmers and consumers in general to pay particular attention to the phrasing of any contract before they sign it. "In this sort of situation," the commissioner said, "be sure the contract guarantees you will receive the merchandise or services for which you are paying." He further suggested that anyone preparing to sign a contract with a firm he did not personally know, should request and check bank references as well as references from persons for whom the firm had performed this service.

In communications with the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture, a Pennsylvania assistant attorney general advised the New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets that "This company thus far has resisted all efforts to obtain information from them that would substantiate their representations."

Prof "Bob" Love Committee Chairman

Professor Robert L. Love of Alfred has been appointed committee chairman of a national organization, the American Society of Allied Health Professions.

Professor Love, who is chairman of the Health Technologies Division at State University Agricultural and Technical College at Alfred, will head the society's Constitution and By-Laws Committee for a two-year term.

The Alfred educator has long been active in ASAHP and was the first chairman of its Council, on Associate Degree and Certificate Programs in 1970.

Professor Love said the national organization was formed in 1967 when it was known as the Association of Schools of Allied Health Professions. The name recently was changed to American Society of Allied Health Professions — (ASAHP).

Professor Love lists the purposes of ASAHP as: (1) to provide leadership in allied health education; (2) to provide a medium for cooperation and communication between schools; (3) to promote development of new allied health programs; (4) to encourage research and study of new needs and approaches in allied health fields; (5) to provide liaison with other health organizations, professional groups and educational and governmental institutions.

James H. Waufile Completes Course

James H. Waufile, Installer/Repairman for the Iroquois Telephone Corporation, Alfred Station, New York, has completed a course in the fundamentals of key telephone systems. The fifteen-day course was held at the Continental Telephone System Training Center, Dulles International Airport, in Washington, D. C.

The course is a study of the circuitry, installation wiring and repair of key telephone systems. A key system is an electro-mechanical switching system into which a number of separate telephone lines can be connected. In this way, one operator can answer a number of incoming lines.

The course puts particular emphasis on having the trainee install and rectify troubles on working key systems. The instructor increases the amount and complexities of the troubles so that each student's knowledge of the equipment is similarly increased.

Announcement

Southern Tier Legal Services has received funding from the United States Office of Economic Opportunity in the amount of \$48,912 to cover the cost of its operations in Steuben, Allegany and Cattaraugus Counties for the six month period from April 1, 1975 through September 30, 1975. This is the same amount that was received last year to serve the three county area. It will be used to provide counselling and representation, both in and out of court, to low income persons with legal problems who reside in the three county area.

The \$48,912 earmarked for the three county area was part of a \$316,325 grant to Monroe County Legal Assistance Corporation which provides legal services to other communities in New York State as well as to the local community. A previous announcement left some people with the impression that the entire \$316,325 grant was intended for use in Steuben, Allegany and Cattaraugus Counties.
