The photos of the 'pet' dogs that killed deer on page 6 of the Wednesday, March 26th issue of the Andover News was most gruesome. I am 'puzzled' or am I? — why the statement, QUOTE: and the hunters are accused of slaughtering deer, was brought up at this time when dogs did the killing. Hunters do slaughter deer, especially when so many of them kill just for the thrill of it. I found several dead deer in the woods after deer season last season but not as many as in years before as the herd was not so large, so naturally not so many slaughtered. It would be better to know that when deer are hunted that the animal was killed instantly but when two to every one killed instantly is wounded and escapes to die in agonizing pain or to live and suffer as a cripple the rest of its life — easy prey to those 'pet' dogs. It is shocking! Two of these crippled by gunshot wounds, deer, dragged themselves back and forth acrossed our road all winter — another gruesome sight to see their trails. I called wildlife protectors and to my knowledge, I wasted money on a phone call.

We can not blame these dogs for killing that deer. This is another sad case where it pin points back to man — the owners of these uncontrolled 'pets' are at fault for the death of the doe that was pregnant. Where was the other unborn fawn? It should of been in the picture — One would think that sights like this would educate the human race to keep their pets under control but rights like these goes to prove that the hour is very fast approaching when man will inflict upon his environment it's moral wound, and in so doing shall insure his own destruction.

Were the owners of the deer killing dogs known? I suppose not — it will go on and on. I am one concerned about the welfare of our Wildlife and I am concerned about the way could care less human beings have no heart for anything.

Where the deer was 'torn apart' alive, was it not in a place where there is much activity? It seems that some one could of come to the rescue of the unfortunate creature of the wilds — what wilds? there isn't much of anything left — WAKE UP AMERICA!!!

William A. Argentieri

William A. Argentieri, president of the Steuben County Bar Association and a general partner in the Hornell Law Firm of Shults and Shults, has been elected to the board of trustees of Alfred University.

Argentieri was elected to a three year term at the board's April 4 meeting on the Alfred campus. He succeeds Dr. Cora G. Saltarelli of Snyder, who resigned in 1974.

Dr. M. Richard Rose, the University president, characterized Argentieri's election as part of an effort to improve the University's "service posture to the surrounding area."

"We're looking to Bill Argentieri as a person who can represent Alfred University to the Hornell community, and who also will be able to represent Hornell to Alfred," he president said.

A 1949 graduate of Alfred University, Argentieri, 46, received his degree from the University of Buffalo in 1953. He has practiced law in Hornell for the past 19 years and is a former Hornell assistant city judge.

Argentieri currently serves as attorney for the Alfred-Almond Friendship and Canaseraga Central School Districts, the Hornell City School District, and the Villages of Almond and Andover.
