'75 Maple Festival-Huge Success

The 3rd Annual Allegany-Steuben Maple Festival, sponsored by the Andover Lions Club, has been termed a "Huge Success" by both sponsors and participants.

The snow, wind, freezing temperatures, icy roads, and blizzard like conditions that prevailed over most of the 2-day Foctival failed to dampen the spirits of the Andover Lions and the many, many other participants.
