QUALIFIERS ON SCHEDULE

With the winter apparently over, Holland International Speedway will conduct its practice, time trials and qualifying events this Sunday, April 27 from 1:00 - 6:00 p. m. This will be the first opportunity for the popular Divisions of Late Model Sportsman, Limited Sportsman and Challengers to try out for the 1975 season. Time trials will first be conducted to determine starting positions in the qualifying heats. The finish of the qualifying preliminaries will then take place and pole outside positions for the opening events on Saturday, May 3.

The Speedway has announced construction of an all new Official Tower and Press Box to be labeled the Genesee Sky Tower. Its structure is being constructed to the rear of the grandstand area elevated above the last row. The entire structure will be glass enclosed. The center section will be the operations area including scoring and timing. The remainder of the tower is divided into four self-contained booths, each containing 20 elevated seats. One booth has been reserved exclusively for working press. Each booth contains its own hospitality facilities, carpeting, sound control, lighting in addition to being air-conditioned and heated. The facilities are similar to those provided by the other major league sports in the Western New York area. Although the economy is in a so-called "Recession", pre-race registrations continue to exceed all previous seasons. The new Challenger-Charger Division now has in excess of 40 entries. The popular Late Model Sportsman and Limited Sportsman ranks have been swelled with newcomers. New Late Model Sportsman entries include Kirk Johnson of Portville, Steve "Goat" Hill of East Aurora, Bob Riffel of Buffalo, John Consiglia of Amherst and the return of Dick Young of Lima. New entries in the Limited Sportsman Division include the Pavilion racing team of Manley Yonburg and Mike Lowyden, former, Charger Rookie of the Year Bob Boyle of Middleport, and Mike Ticeo of Kenmore.

The admission prices remain at the 1974 level with an additional one-half price ticket being offered to any student between the ages of 14 and 22, with proper and current school identification. Admission for the time trials and qualifying events is 50¢ for adults, kids free.
