The following selection was taken from the Reporter, a publication issued for schools.

"THE GOOD OLD DAYS — THEY WERE TERRIBLE"

In a book titled "The Good Old Days—They Were Terrible" (Random House), author Otto Bettmann notes that a look at those good days is a sure cure for nostalgia.

Bettmann, whose Bettmann Archives is a major source of graphics of the past, makes it clear to all that "the good old days were good for but the privileged few." Horsecar drivers received \$12 a week for a 16-hour day. Their demands for a 12-hour day was branded "communistic" by State Assemblyman Teddy Roosevelt — A pharmaceutical firm gave the world aspirin; it also developed heroin and marketed it as a cough medicine. We had 100,000 drug addicts in 1888, in the good old days. And those who yearn for the ocean air of days gone by are reminded that New York in 1900 had 150,000 horses each "producing between 20 and 25 pounds of manure a day."

Concludes Bettmann: "The 'Gay Nineties' man is to be 'pitied rather than envied.'"

The book not only reminds us of the horrors of the past and shows us how far we've come, but it gives us hope that — despite our present struggles — man will "not only endure but prevail."
