American Legion Birthday Dinner A Big Success !!

The Lynch-Burgess Post No. 397 American Legion Anniversary Dinner, held on the American Legion Auxiliary building evening, May 10, 1975, turned out to be a big success. A large number of guests, including many of the Legion members, guests were introduced and then Post Commander Yorton introduced Navy Senior Chief Carl E. Stone of the U. S. Navy Recruiting Station in Olean.

Senior Chief Stone gave a very interesting talk on the up-dating of the United States Navy and told how many of our present Nuclear Warships only needed to be refueled once every 13 years.

Chief Stone spoke on the capabilities of our Nuclear Submarines which have the potential of being submerged for periods up to 6 months at a time with Polaris missiles pre-programmed for designated targets any where in the world which could be fired to counter a Nuclear Attack on the United States. He explained that our modern ships are entirely self-sufficient with re-supply being carried out at sea under classified conditions (night or day) at pre-determined locations.

Navy Chief Stone stated that re-supply is progressing at a percentage rate of 102% and noted that some women are now entering the heavy equipment and diesel engineering field as well as boiler room operation.

Following his talk, Chief Stone conducted a question and answer period which was well received.

Before the meeting broke up, it was announced that the American Legion installation of newly elected Officers will be May 20th in the Legion Hall at 8 p. m., with plans made to serve a lunch following the meeting.

School Board Holds Monthly Meetings

The regular meeting of the Board of Education of Andover Central School was called to order at 8:00 on May 12, 1975. The following members were present: Francis Horan, Conner Stephens, Carl Atwell, Mary K. Slade, Wm Walker and District Principal Mr. Curville Jordan.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read for approval. Carl Atwell made the motion and Francis Horan seconded. Passed by 3 votes of yes.

The bills for the General Fund were approved for payment for \$17,440.10. Seconded by Carl Atwell and motion made by Conner Stephens. Passed by 3 votes of yes.

The bills for the Cafeteria were approved for payment for \$2,374.51. Conner Stephens made the motion and Carl Atwell seconded the motion. Passed by 3 votes of yes.

The bills for Title II were approved for payment for \$266.92. Francis Horan made the motion and Carl Atwell seconded the motion. Passed by 3 votes of yes.

The Treasurer's and Clerk's Reports were read for comparison. Carl Atwell made the motion to accept these reports as read and Conner Stephens seconded the motion. Passed by 3 votes of yes.

The Cafeteria report was read by Mr. Jordan. Francis Horan made the motion to file this report with the minutes — showing a net profit of \$423.44 for the year. Carl Atwell seconded the motion. Passed by 3 votes of yes.

The gross payrolls were read for the approval of the Board. Total \$46,240.55. Carl Atwell made the motion to approve these and Conner Stephens seconded the motion. Passed by 3 votes of yes.

Conner Stephens approved paying L. C. Whitford \$3,576.60 and Abbey-Henningway-Coats \$71.52 — repair work done on the school. Carl Atwell seconded the motion. Passed by 3 votes of yes.

The board approved the use of \$4,145.00 Hurricane Agnes funds received this year to replace equipment that was repaired after the flood but needs replacing. This amount will not cover the complete cost of replacing the equipment needed but will make it possible to do this. Conner Stephens made the motion and Francis Horan seconded. Passed by 4 votes of yes.

Motion was made to award Honeywell Inc., Amherst, Annual Heating Maintenance Contract. Atwell made the motion and Stephens seconded. Passed by 4 votes of yes.

Mary K. Slade moved and Atwell seconded that the bid of Donald Thompson and Son be accepted for purchase of the old station wagon. Sale will be completed upon receipt of the new wagon. Motion carried.

Motion was made by Conner Stephens. Carl Atwell seconded that the Board go ahead with plans for the School Bus Garage and Site and present cost at the Annual Meeting. Motion carried.

Carl Atwell made the motion that we accept the proposed 1975-76 budget. William Walker seconded the motion which was carried.

William Walker moved, Mary K. Slade seconded that we have a Summer Band Program under the direction of Wayne Coates. Motion was carried.

Francis Horan made the motion and Carl Atwell seconded that we permit Mr. Russell to Intern-Administrative under Mr. Jordan. Motion was carried.

Mary K. Slade moved to accept the Committee of Accounts report. Conner Stephens seconded. Motion was carried.

Mr. Slade was given the Tenure upon the recommendation of Mr. Jordan. Carl Atwell moved, Mary K. Slade seconded and motion was carried.
