The Rev. Otto J. Vogt celebrated his Jubilee Mass of Thanksgiving at St. Mary's Church in Rexville, Sunday, June 1 at 1 P. M. Father Vogt is pastor of both St. Joachim's Church in Canisteo and St. Mary's Church in Rexville. The Most Rev. Dennis W. Hickey, Auxiliary Bishop of the Rochester Diocese, gave the homily for the liturgy of Thanksgiving.

Coc celebrants with Father Vogt and Bishop Hickey were the Revs. John S. Hayes pastor of St. Patrick's Church in Aurora and St. Michael's Church in Union Springs and Joseph Egan, pastor of St. Patrick's Church in Elmira. Visiting priests also shared in the liturgy of the Mass. The Rev. Robert Price, pastor of the United Methodist Church in Canisteo, represented the Canisteo Council of Churches and the Canisteo clergy.

Readings of the Mass were read by Lois Ann Vogt of Wayland, Father Vogt's daughter, and by Justin W. Vogt of Canisteo, Father Vogt's brother. For the prayer of the Faithful, a family from each parish presented a petition and prayer. Families of each parish previously selected. Father Vogt brought gifts of bread and wine to the altar for the Liturgy of the Eucharist. Mrs. Ann Vogt, mother of the jubilarian, presented the chalice to be used during the Mass. It was the same chalice given to Father Vogt by his family at the time of his ordination. The bread used for the Eucharist was made by Father Vogt's mother and his housekeeper. Families from his former parish assignments from Rochester, Elmira, Canisteo, Elmira and Dansville were invited to take part in the celebration.

Music for the Mass was a combination of folk melody and hymns shared by the congregation. The folk group "Up With People" from St. Patrick's Church in Seneca Falls provided musical accompaniment and voice for the folk melodies. Mrs. Joanne Cooney, organist of St. Joachim's provided organ music for traditional hymns. Mark Thurkins was trombonist and Altar Boys from both parishes served at the Mass.

Father Vogt attended a reception in his honor from 2:30 to 4:30 Sunday at St. Joachim's Parish Hall on Green Street in Canisteo. The public was invited.

On June 3, the anniversary date of his ordination, Father Vogt returned to his home parish, St. Joseph's in Wayland, to offer a Mass at 11 A. M. for area relatives and friends.

Father Vogt's first pastorate was St. Joachim's and St. Mary's Churches. He was recently appointed pastor of St. Paul of the Cross Church in Honeye Falls. The Rev. Francis J. Erb, pastor of St. Pius V Church in Cohocton, has been named pastor of St. Joachim's Church in Canisteo and St. Mary's Church in Rexville. Father Erb was ordained in 1954 and has been pastor of the church in Cohocton since early 1973. He will assume his new duties in Canisteo and Rexville June 28. Father Erb, a Rochester native, was graduated from Aquinas Institute in Rochester before entering St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's Seminaries there. He was assistant pastor of St. Patrick's and St. Mary's Churches in Elmira; St. Michael's and St. Andrew's Churches in Rochester; St. Rita's Church in West Webster and Sacred Heart Church in Owasco.

Greenwood School Board opened bids on the sewer project and for the sale of two school buses at last week's meeting. The apparent low bid submitted for the sewer relocation project was \$8,597 from Trika Construction Corp., of Spencerport. Engineering consultant, Robert Hunt of Addison will review bids and make a recommendation. The project had been bid in April and all bids received were over the estimated cost of \$20,000 for the project. The plans were modified and readvertised.

Burns Motor Co. of Greenville, S. C. will purchase two used school buses. A bid of \$1,085 for the 30 passenger bus and \$1,265 for the 60 passenger bus was submitted.

The resignation of Charlotte Canfield as Clerk under the Emergency Employment Act was accepted and Lillian Spencer of Greenwood, was appointed to the position.

There was a discussion of post graduate students attending BOCES Center in Hornell. The Board adopted the policy that it must receive the request in writing to attend BOCES by May 1 of the preceding school year. The action was taken to facilitate budgeting.

The Board expressed an interest in participating for an early admissions program with the State Agricultural and Technical College at Alfred. Students would attend Alfred a half-day and Greenwood a half-day and receive college credit for courses at both. The program is only in Liberal Arts.

The Board held a hearing at the school Wednesday night on the proposed Budget for 1975-76. There were 30 people present and Principal Gary Moore explained the Budget. The proposed State Aid sheet had just been received that day. The planned budget is \$843,75.62. This increases \$124,000 already voted and appropriated.
