Voters of Greenwood School District voted on a budget of \$734,640.20 for the next school year, Tuesday. This is up \$15,272.52 over last year's budget of \$649,817.72. There has been no computation of the amount to be raised locally and no estimate of taxes. Information on the assessments and equalization rates have not been received. All utilities are up causing increases and there are some program changes. Mrs. Jeanne Hollenbeck, Physical Education Teacher, now teaches two days and will be given an additional day because of more girls athletes. Also included in the budget is a half-time Junior High Softball and Math Teacher. That would permit both Math and Science to be taught in the grades all the school year. Now they are alternated on a five week basis. It would free Math Teacher, Raymond Duke and Science Teacher Roy Yarnell for more senior high instruction. Each now teaches grades seven through twelve. Missions have not been completed with the faculty on salary. Replacement of math textbooks

in Kindergarten through Eighth Grade is included in materials and supplies.

There is an increase in the sports appropriations since the district will be offering a full program for both boys and girls. There will also be an increase in music and art to increase the high school art program; to purchase new music and the repair and placement of band instruments.

The \$20,000 in last year's budget for the sewer project has been carried over into the new year. Work includes replacement of the tile floors in the 1936 portion of the building at a cost of \$8,000, replacement of 106 lockers in the 1936 portion of the building at a cost of \$3,500 and repair to the pool filter system. The projects on the building would receive 74.3 per cent through State Aid.

Voters are also asked to approve \$7000 for a 48 passenger school bus. In the 1976 budget will be included a similar resolution and the bus will be bought then.
