Caterpillar Defoliation Termed Not Serious

The Linden Leopard and the Fall Cankerworm caterpillars are causing considerable alarm to the homeowners, according to J. J. Eckert, Regional Forester with the Division of Lands and Forests. These one-inch long, light green caterpillars can be found in most hardwood trees, causing varying degrees of defoliation. A slight breeze triggers a stimulus to drop from their feed areas while attached to a fine thread. This condition adds to the annoyance of the picnicker, camper, or homeowner drawn to the trees' shade. They don't bite, don't invade house and eat only leaves.

The two insects of concern are both very cyclic in nature. Due to the warm spring without the usual late frost, we are experiencing a high population. The defoliation this year is expected to be heavy in isolated areas and extensive throughout Region 9. We can expect feeding for another four to five weeks. Most hardwoods can withstand two years of defoliation without being seriously damaged. Trees defoliated this early in the year usually put out a second set of leaves.
