They are in a variety of subjects from Civil War History to Literature. Mr. Baker was a retired engineer and died at the age of 91. His niece Mrs. Roberta Baker McGowan of Owego, N.Y., had the pick of books first and Corning University was given the balance, mostly mathematics books.

The Central School Board met Monday night and approved a request to the State Education Department for a pre-school classroom room for the school. The Board authorized bids for milk products. There was a record vote for the School Budget and Board members of 247 persons. At the eight week meeting, Virgil Humes, Chairman, presented the Report of the Board. The Budget of 1975-76, including 124,000 already appropriated for building needs, was approved 163 to 73. This is a 10 per cent raise from last year. Proposition 2 approved a \$1,200,000 bond issue by 211 for and 28 against. Proposition 3 approved a request to set aside \$7000 this year towards a 48 passenger bus an additional \$7000 to go in the 1976-77 budget.
