INSURANCE DEADLINE Viet nam Era veterans separated from active duty between April 2, 1970, and July 31, 1974, are eligible for low cost Veterans Group Life Insurence (VOR.I) but they must apply before August 1, 1975. This insurance program is designed as interim protection during read-justment to civillan life. Non-re-newable five-year term coverage is available in multiples of \$5,000 up to \$20,000. Monthly premium for the maximum experient \$2.40. up to \$20,000. Mondhy premium for the maximum coverage is \$3.40 for veterans ages 34 and under and \$6.80 for those 35 and over.
