A.C.S. Annual Meeting Held Tue.

The meeting of the residents of the Andover Central School Dist. No. 1 was held on Tuesday, June 24th, 1975 in the ACS School Auditorium. The meeting was called to order by the Chairman, Rev. Ray Albaugh.

The minutes of the 1974 meeting were read by the Board Clerk Mary K. Slade. The Chairman asked for a motion to accept the minutes as read — motion was made by Jean Long and seconded by Francis Vickers. Motion accepted.

Tax Collector's Report for the school year 1974-75 was read by Mrs. Kelley.

Amount of Taxes levied \$253,427.36

Total Taxes Collected 228,927.42

Total Taxes returned to County 24,499.94

The motion was made to accept this report as read by Glenn Bronson and seconded by Elmo Barden. Motion accepted.

The proposed annual budget for the school year 1975-76 was presented by Mr. Curville Jordan.

Resolved, that the Board of Education of School District Number 1, Towns of Andover, Alfred, Wellsville, Independence, Ward and Greenwood in the Counties of Allegany and Steuben by and hereby is authorized to expend the sums set forth above of \$1,021,058.93, and to levy the necessary tax therefor of \$275,703.29 and to provide for a planned balance of \$14,000.00. — Vote Yes — 166 — No — 62

A petition was properly filed with the Clerk of the Board of Education by Francis Horan for membership of the Board of Education for a term of five years to succeed himself. — Vote — 195 — Write In Vote — 2 — Ed Wilson — Francis Cable — 1.

Resolved that the Board of Education of Central School District No. 1 — Andover — is hereby authorized and directed to purchase one school bus and expend therefor a sum of not exceeding \$17,000.00 (\$18,316.00 — less trade in of \$1,250.00 or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be raised by tax on the taxable property of the school district to be collected in annual installments, and further resolved, that the Board of Education is authorized to issue obligations of the District therefor in accordance with the Education Law and Local Finance Law. — Vote Yes — 183 — No — 45

Resolution for the construction of a Bus Garage and Acquisition of a Site is attached. — Vote — Yes 137 — No 65

The Chairman of the meeting asked if there was any old business or any new business — Motion to close the meeting was made by Philip MacMichael and seconded by Donald Mulconery.

RESOLUTION FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF A BUS GARAGE AND ACQUISITION

OF SITE

At a regular meeting of the Board of Education of the Andover Central School District held on the 12th day of May, 1975, it was resolved that the District build a new bus garage and that the services of an architect be hired for the purpose of preparing plans and specifications for such garage, and WHEREAS, pursuant to such resolution, a notice was duly published in the official newspaper of the District which notice has appeared in compliance with the Education Law and the other appropriate statutes in the State of New York, and which notice provided that the proposition to build a new bus garage would be submitted to the voters of the District for their approval at the annual School District meeting to be held on June 24, 1975, and

WHEREAS, the Board of Education has been provided with figures that establish the cost of constructing the new bus garage facility which has been estimated by the Board's architect to be in the amount of \$120,000.00 and the cost of acquiring the site has been agreed upon in the amount of

Miss Ruth M. Baker of Main St., died at her home Tuesday, June 24, 1975 following a brief illness.

She was born March 12, 1894 in Andover, a daughter of Byron and Nellie Lusk Baker, and lived most of her life in the family home at Tip Top, moving into the Village in 1959.

Miss Baker attended Andover High School and graduated from Salamanna Teachers Training Class and the Genesee State Normal School. She taught eight years in the Railroad Valley School and two years at Alfred Station. She then became a member of the Andover Central School system and taught here for 35 years, retiring in 1964.

She was a member of the Andover Presbyterian Church, the United Presbyterian Women's Organization, Anna W. McArthur Chapter No. 242 OES; Charter member of the Andover PTA; Edward Seaman Relief Corp.; Retired Teachers Organization; and Golden Age Club. She is survived by two sisters, Mrs. Rea Henderson of Rochester and Mrs. Ethel Wilbur of Cleveland, Ohio; and several nieces and nephews.

ED as follows:

1. That the Board of Education hereby resolves, subject to the approval of the voters, to build a bus garage facility at a cost not to exceed \$125,000.00, which includes the cost of construction and cost of site acquisition.

2. That the Board further resolves that in order to fund the cost of the project that bonds of the District shall be issued to fund the same in whole or in part.

3. That the Board hereby submits to the District voters for their approval a proposition to build a bus garage facility at a cost not to exceed \$125,000.00, including site acquisition.

4. That this proposition be submitted to the voters at a meeting to be held on June 24, 1975 and that the same be voted on by paper ballot.

5. This resolution shall take effect immediately.
