It should be noted that the entire proceeds of the Stock Transfer Tax from the State of \$104 million would go to New York City. It is also well to remember that prior to the passage of the New York City tax package, all of these taxes authorized by the Assembly have been passed with only Democratic votes and not a single Republican vote. And none of the taxes listed here passed the Senate.

The irony of all this lies in the fact that Governor Carey openly admitted several weeks ago that this State could and would survive this year without the massive increases which he had been advocating since January. Furthermore new studies by the Minority Ways and Means staff have shown that not only are new taxes unnecessary for the current 1975-76 fiscal year, but projected revenue estimates would seem to show no need for new taxes in fiscal 1976-77 as well.

A report by Republican Minority members by Assemblyman Willis H. Stephens, ranking minority member of the Ways and Means Committee, indicated a probable range of 1976-77 revenue increases of \$635 to \$832 million. The report continued: "Close control of spending can and should mean that that no new state tax increases will be needed if the current 1975-76 fiscal year, nor in the 1976-77 fiscal year ahead. This is good news for the state's taxpayers and helps assure that there will be a strong economic recovery in New York State." Thus the passage of these massive tax increases by Assembly Democrats has been an unnecessary exercise in futility.

Meanwhile, there is no doubt that some new tax authorization must be finalized for the City of New York. This is the annual task of the Legislature, but the size of those tax increases is the question here. The Republican-controlled Senate has told Mayor Beame that they feel tax increases in the neighborhood of \$150 million should be sufficient if he would just do something to curtail the giant spending practices of the City. The Mayor looks threatening in the joy of thousands of municipal employees, but this far there has been little evidence that this is anything but a threat.

## EMERY SCORES CAREY ON TOWN ROAD FUNDS LIMIT; INVITES HIM TO TOUR 136th DISTRICT

Assemblyman James L. Emery has sent a letter to Governor Carey expressing his disappointment that the Governor is attempting to limit state funds for the town roads rebuilding project known as the Donovan Road Plan. At the same time Mr. Emery has invited the Governor to tour the 136th Assembly District and see the results of town road work under funds authorized by the plan in previous years as well as deteriorated roads in need of repair.

In the letter dated June 18 Assemblyman Emery noted that the program was originally begun under the leadership of Senator Austin Edwin of Genesee and was known for years as the Edwin Road Plan. "Rebuilding of roads in rural communities was a necessity to get products from rural areas to the cities and the program was dubbed the 'farm to market program,'" he wrote.

In the past several years, when the Republicans were in the Majority in both the Assembly and Senate, the legislation to provide state funds for the program was carried by Assemblyman Emery in the Assembly and Senator James Donovan in the Senate. Last year legislation authorized the State to fund these town road projects up to 40 per cent of their total costs with the rest of the money coming from the towns.

In his letter to the Governor Emery said he was "greatly disappointed" that Mr. Carey has instructed the Division of the Budget to put a limitation on funds for Donovan Road projects. He wrote: "I feel that this program has as high a priority as anything the great City of New York is you have so ably done this year. What we think of the millions that have gone to the City of New York and yet you cannot raise a dime for update town roads. I can only believe that you are not familiar with the importance of this program."

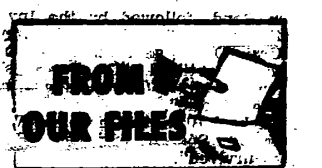
