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Erie and Niagara Insurance Asso. Observes 100 Years of Service

The Erie and Niagara Insurance The Erie and Niagara Insurance Association — largest cooperative insurance organization in New York State — will celebrate its 100th anniversary July 1, 1975. An open house on that date at the association's headquarters at 11450 Main Road, Clarence, N. Y., will mark a century of service to rural policyholders. The public is invited between 1 and 4 P. M. A barquet for ENIA executives, agents and staff will be held in the evening at the Peliamwood House, Transit Road, West Seneca.

The association currently has over 25,000 policyholdens/men bers, mainly farmers, independent businessmen and rural residents. They are served by over 160 general insurance agencies representing. ENIA throughout 14 counties

John A. Hall, a lifelong Lockpart, N. Y. fruit grower, has been president of the association since 1954. Tracing the history of ENIA he said it was started in 1875 by a hand of .59 farmers who found that few companies would provide fire insurance for their barns and Evestock. They formed a mutual cooperative organization by agreeing to pay future losses sustained by any member of their group — a one-for-all, all-for-one counsitment. John A. Hall, a lifelong Lockport,

Two years later, lightning strick a barn in the town of Chirchice, owined by a member of the association. Andrew Carmer. The resulting fire loss of \$1,040 was quickly paid by assessing all other nationals, and the young cooperative had met sta first test. Word of its reinholding and integrity traveled fast. Literally thousands of farmers rushed to john. In the first ten years, membership had multiplies from 59 to nearly 5,000. Independent businessmen joined the association as did rural residents not specifically engaged in farming.

"In our 100-year history, Eric and Nagara has never defaulted on a loss osyment", reported President Had. "We have the largest reserves of any organization of this type in New York State". He noted the association's policytholders are also protected by the New York State, statemance Security Fund.


