Niagara-Mohawk, * Announces Plan

Residential heating customers of

Residential heating customers of Niagara Mohawk can act now to "leve off" the high cost of next winter by enrolling in the utility's budget plan, according to Leon B Kiersz. Niagara Mohawk's Cattar augus Area general manager.

"Our records show that-three-quarters of most heating costs come during the five-month period of November through March, Mr. Kiersz pointed out. "Because more energy is used for heating during these colder months, ser vice bills are higher."

Under the plan, the average annual heating costs of participating customers are estimated in advance. Then certain amounts are added during the summer, beginning in July, and substracted during in July, and substracted during the winter, to equalize monthly costs over the whole year.

"Budge' customers only pay for actual use. Yet monthly bills are about the same, which helps in managing farmiy finances", Mr Kiersz explained.

The utility's heating customers caff enroll in this plan whether meters are read on a monthly or bimonthly basis. Bimonthly customers will receive a monthly bill.

"The service bills that budget customers receive show actual use

"The service bills that budget customers receive show actual use and actual cost" Mr. Kiersz said "and the amount that was adjusted to level off payments".

There is no extra charge for this service. Heating customers already enrolled in the plan need

ready enroned in the plan need not reapply.

"We'll be happy to provide interesting heating customers with more information. Just call our Consumer Relations Office at 372-4100." Mr. Kiersz said.
