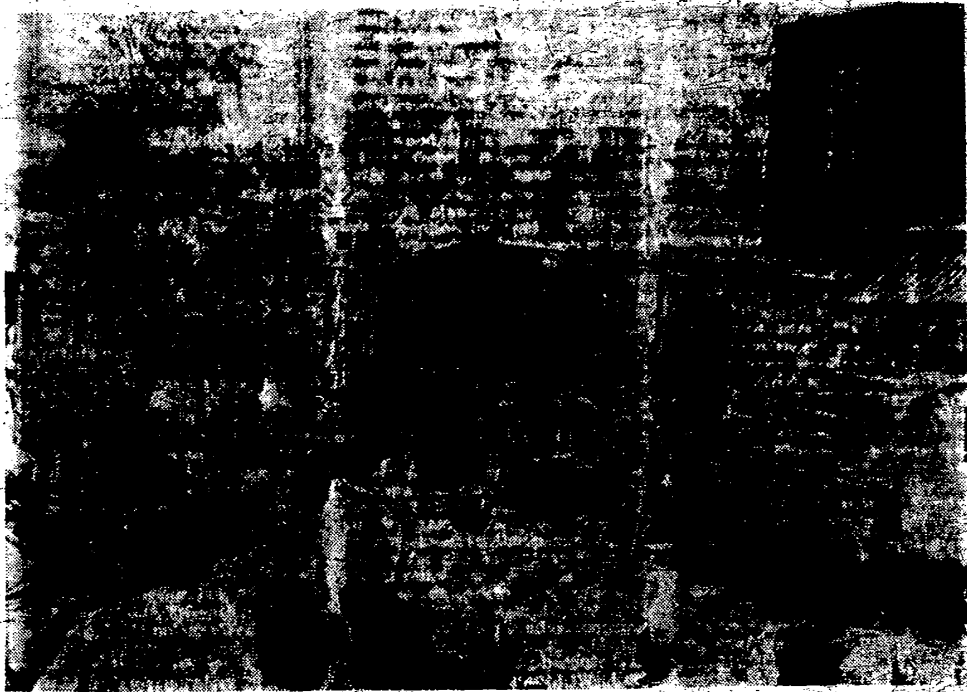

To The Editor:

As an active taxpayer (not a soon to be one) who has already paid many hundreds of dollars to the Town of Friendship, but will be unable to vote in the very important upcoming vote on the Zoning issue, I would like to make a few comments.

The writer recently scanned a copy of the proposed Zoning Law and feels every qualified voter should obtain and study that road map to the Promised Land VERY CAREFULLY. Take particular note of the things you CANNOT DO with the property you thought belonged to you. Then go back and underline the things you MUST DO or bear the wrath and penalty of the local Zoning Czar, whose salary you will help pay.

Ask questions and insist on specific answers from your Town Board. Talk to people who have lived under Zoning, and take the arguments and opinions of those who favor it but haven't had any real experience with the matter, with the proverbial grain of salt. Be particularly wary of the "experts" who manage to pay a few if any taxes but offer unlimited advice as to what the "Government" should legislate and spend.

Look into and analyze the experience of Houston, Texas. If a large modern city like Houston can progress steadily WITHOUT ZONING why cannot the small town of Friendship?

Obtain a copy of the July 1975 issue of "ORGANIC GARDENING" — hardly a media for Rabbie Rousing propaganda — and read the two articles grouped in the contents as "ZONING vs. FOOD SECURITY". Talk to some of the concerned citizens if you run into unforeseen problems.

Incorporate what you have learned with a good dose of common sense and I think you will want to cast a firm, emphatic NO to the Zoning Vote on July 17, 1975.
