## 21 Students at ACS To Participate In Title I Reading Project

During the 1974-75 school year, 21 students at Andover Central School were selected to participate in a Title I Reading Project. The students were selected by pre-testing in September and 21 students who scored at or below the three standings on the Metropolitan Achievement Test were selected to participate in the program. The students were in grades two through six.

Those students who participated received 60 hours of individual tutoring by Mrs. Genevieve Joyce or Mrs. Lee Meyn, under the direction of Miss Joyce Harris, Reading Teacher at A.C.S. They were tutored three days per week for 1 1/2 hour each, supplemental to their regular reading program. The results of the program were very encouraging. All students gained more than predicted. ## More Young People Needed In Alleg. County Youth Job Bank

After one week's operation the Allegany County Youth Job Bank has enrolled approximately 100 residents of Allegany County, between the ages of 14 and 18; in the program.

During the first week only five work requests for youth were received from area employers, but all requests were immediately filled. Two youths were placed in part-time work situations for the summer, whereas the others are working with area farmers for an extended period of time.

More young people are needed, however. Areas such as Alfred, Almond, Canaseraga, Bolivar, Cuba, and Angelica have very few applicants. Also, a greater number of youths over 16 from all areas are needed for the files. All county youths qualified for the program are encouraged to get an application and working papers from their school's guidance office and send the applications to the central office in Belmont.

The major thrust of the service at this time is seeking employer contacts. Again it should be emphasized that all types of employment may be arranged through the Youth Job Bank. Youths enrolled in this non-profit employment service, although willing, are not looking for full-time summer employment. They are aware that such jobs aren't available. Therefore, applicants are interested in almost any kind of work for almost any length of time.

Most applicants express an interest in doing service jobs for homeowners and private citizens. Painting, babysitting, cleaning, moving, yardwork, pet care and sewing are just a few of the many jobs the youths are ready and willing to tackle. Waitressing, clerking, typing, service station work and farm labor are also job opportunities area youths desire.

The Youth Job Bank would like to make an appeal to county homeowners and businessmen to look for jobs that need to be done around the home or business and hire a young person through the job bank service to do the job. This simple act does more than get the job done. Young people are aided economically and also given some experience in the "world of work". A more immediate outcome is that youths involved in meaningful employment are less likely to become involved with negative elements in the area. Employing a youth could also alleviate some of the boredom and discouragement often experienced by kids during the summer months.

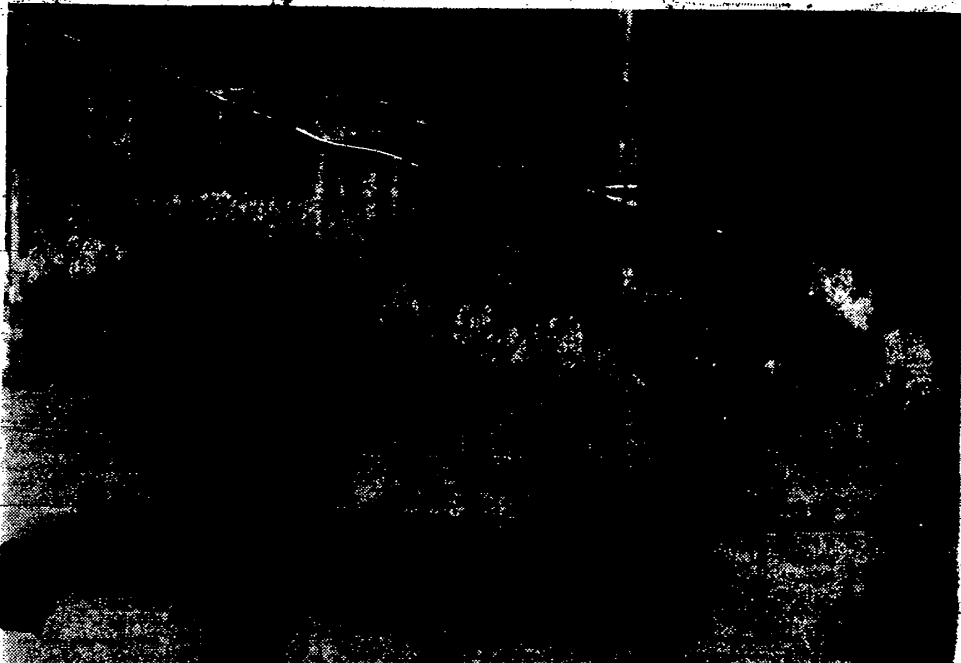

## Veteran News

### LISTEN VETERAN

**HOME LOANS FOR WIDOWS OR WIDOWERS** Unmarried widows or widowers of veterans of WW II, the Korean Conflict, post-Korean Conflict, or Vietnam Era service whose deaths were service-connected, are eligible for a GI home loan.

**WHAT'S THE DIFFERENCE?** When it comes to pension and compensation there is a difference. Compensation is paid to a veteran to help compensate him for service-incurred injuries. On the other hand, pension is paid to permanently and totally disabled veterans of service-incurred injuries. However, pension is based on disability, not on service. It is paid only if income does not exceed established income limitations.

**DENIED CLAIMS - APPEALS ALLOWED** Many veterans and dependents are of the opinion that once a claim for compensation or pension has been denied by a VA Regional Office the case is closed. This is not true. A denial of a claim may be appealed as high as the Board of Veterans' Appeals in Washington, D. C. If a claim for compensation or pension has been denied, a simple letter of disagreement based on a point of law may be submitted to the Regional Office where the denial originated. New additional substantiating evidence may also be furnished in support of the original claim. These actions can be taken by veterans who have had a claim denied before the necessity of appealing to Washington. Individuals who have had a claim denied and wish to appeal should contact the local counseling center of the New York State Division of Veterans' Affairs located at the Municipal Bldg., Wellsville, N. Y., on Tuesdays and at the City Bldg., 100 Broadway, Hornell, N. Y. on Mondays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays.
