## Grocery Gems & Goodies

Well Folks, "unit pricing" shelf signs will go into effect on August 1, 1975 so watch for this feature that is supposed to assist all New York Shoppers in their grocery buying. There is a new law that also just went into effect that says: "No Smoking in Public Places" that carries a minimum \$100 fine. Just how it will be interpreted or enforced we don't know but we advise everyone to "watch out" until we can all see what is going to happen!

In our column before the Fourth we covered ground beef and ham cuts so this week we will cover the different cuts of steak. Round steak comes from the back leg of the animal, and usually includes a round bone. The sections — inside, outside, or sometimes called bottom and top, and sirloin top are frequently sold separately.

Sirloin cuts are from the hip portion of the animal and offer has an oval or egg-shaped bone. In addition to this hip bone, the cuts may also contain portions of the back bone. These cuts are naturally tender in the higher grades and are best cooked by dry-heat methods.

Porterhouse steak is often sold interchangeably with T-Bone steaks but it contains a larger portion of the tenderloin muscle. Porterhouse and T-Bone steaks may be recognized by the T-shaped bone with the large "eye" muscle, the loineye, on one side and the smaller tenderloin muscle on the other. In the higher grades these cuts are very tender, juicy and flavorful.

Filet Mignon is a boneless steak cut from the tenderloin muscle and is generally considered the most tender beef cut.

Delmonica Steak is sometimes used for a boneless beef steak which consists primarily of the "ribeye" muscle and is stripped lengthwise from the rib cuts.

Prime rib is a name sometimes used for a beef rib roast and, in that context, it does not mean the grade is U. S. Prime — it could be any grade. This comes from the rib section of the animal behind the shoulder.

(More on meat cuts next week) In our "buys of the week" 3-legged fryers are on sale for 59c per pound; boneless chuck roast is only \$1.29 per pound; frozen boneless veal steak at \$1.69 per pound; and braunschwieger is going for 79c a pound.

In the produce department, California oranges are back in again with a 4-lb. bag selling for 99c; and California cantaloupes are 79c each.
