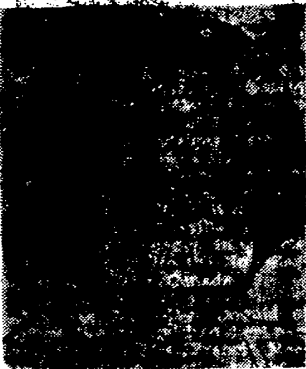


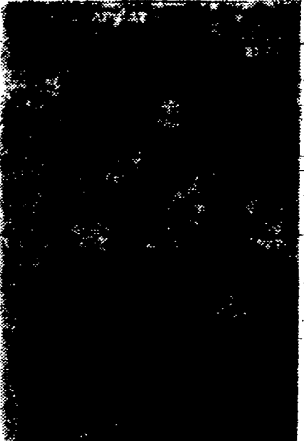
Four ACS Faculty and Staff Members Retire



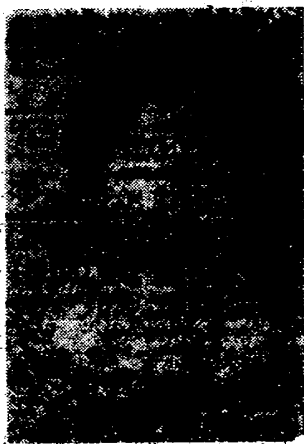
Miss Doris Church

Three members of the faculty and one staff member of the Andover Central School are retiring. The three members of the faculty, whose careers in education total seventy-six and one-half years, retired from the Andover Central School faculty this June. The three teachers are Miss Doris Church and Mrs. Mary Peckham, both second grade teachers, and Mr. Joseph Mumma, senior high mathematics.

Miss Doris Church has taught thirty of her forty years at Andover. The other ten years of Miss Church's teaching career were spent in Jasper, South Howard and Alfred Station. She received her degree at Genesee State. This year at graduation, in honor of Miss Church, a Doris Church Award was presented by Mr. and Mrs. Richard Byndas to the senior who had faithfully served and supported ACS.

Mrs. Mary Peckham, who also received her BA in Education from

Genesee State, has twenty-two and one-half years of teaching experience, twenty of which have been in Andover. Her teaching career includes sixth grade at East Bloomfield and Allentown, kindergarten at Richburg and second grade at Andover.

Mr. Joseph Mumma, a graduate of Otterbein College, has also done graduate work at St. Bonaventure and Alfred University. Having been awarded National Science Fellowships, Mr. Mumma spent summer sessions at Franklin Marshall and Hamilton College. He taught mathematics at Portville from 1961 through 1964 and then came to Andover.

Mrs. Frances Langworthy returned to Andover in 1962 and joined the cafeteria staff at Andover Central School. Mrs. Langworthy now resides in Scio where she is enjoying her new home and thinking about doing some traveling in the future.

Motion was made to nominate Mary K. Slade for President by Francis Horan — seconded by Conner Stephens. Carried by 4 votes of yes.

A motion to nominate Ethel Kelley as Treasurer was made by Carl Atwell, seconded by Francis Horan. Carried by 4 votes of yes.

A motion was made by Conner Stephens that the Official Depository be the Andover Branch of the Citizens National Bank. Seconded by Francis Horan. Carried by 4 votes of yes.

A motion was made by Francis Horan that Curville Jordan be Purchasing Agent for the school. Seconded by Carl Atwell. Carried by 4 votes of yes.

A motion was made by Carl Atwell that the Citizens National Bank and Trust Co., be the site of Tax Collection. Motion was made by Carl Atwell and seconded by Mary K. Slade. Carried by 4 votes of yes.

A motion was made that Dr. Common be appointed Dental Supervisor for the school. Motion made by Francis Horan, seconded by Carl Atwell. Carried by 4 votes of yes.

A motion was made and carried that the monthly meeting night will be the second Monday evening of each month at 8:00. Motion was made by Conner Stephens and seconded by Mary K. Slade. Carried by 4 votes of yes.

The motion was made and carried that Doris Mulconery be appointed Treasurer of the Inter Class funds, and that Mr. Jordan be appointed Advisor. Motion was made by Francis Horan and seconded by Carl Atwell. Carried by 4 votes of yes.

A motion was made that William Walker be appointed as the Board Teachers' representative. Motion was made by Francis Horan and seconded by Carl Atwell. Carried by 4 votes of yes.

A motion was made by Francis Horan and seconded by Conner Stephens to pay the bills for the months of June and July. Carried by 4 votes of yes.

A motion was made that Conner Stephens be Clerk of the Board of Education by Mary K. Slade. Seconded by Francis Horan. Passed by 4 votes of yes.

The Andover Medical Center was approved as the school Drs. for the 1975-76 school year. The motion was made by Francis Horan and seconded by Carl Atwell. Carried by 4 votes of yes.

Payrolls for the month of June totalled \$22,762.84. Francis Horan made the motion to approve the payment of these. Carl Atwell seconded the motion. Passed by 4 votes of yes.

The Andover News was appointed as the Official Newspaper. Carl Atwell made the motion, Francis Horan seconded it. Carried by 4 votes of yes.

Doris Mulconery was appointed as Petty Cashier. Mary K. Slade made the motion, seconded by Conner Stephens. The School Principal, Mr. Jordan was appointed as Advisor. Carried by 4 votes of yes.

Carl Atwell made the motion that William Angerter be appointed as the School Attorney and Francis Horan seconded the motion.

Francis Horan made the motion that the meeting be adjourned at 10:45.

Andover collected 6 singles. Jim Manske, Pat Atwell, Steve Dibble, Rex Vosburg, Eric MacMichael, and Ron Glover each had 1 piece.
