## ACS Players Prove Their Point In Section V Play

Coach Coon, Mr. Russell, the whole school and all the loyal followers of the Baseball Team had very much praise for the Team this season. Even though the Team compiled a regular season record of 5 wins and 7 losses and placed third place behind Scio and Belmont in the Allegany D South League, they defeated Angelica 6 to 4, and won the Allegany D North with a record of 9 wins and 1 loss. Angelica was undefeated for most of the season.

In the pre-regular final game played at Hornell against Jasper, Andover came in as the underdog, but defeated them 5 to 3 with three runs in the top of the Seventh Inning and hung on for the win as Jasper threatened in the bottom of the Seventh. The game winning hit was a double by Dale Russell who drove in two runs, with two outs in the top of the Seventh. On the play, Jay MacMichael was on third and Rob Hyland was on second. After the big inning, Jasper came to bat and started off on the right foot as Andover committed two errors to put two baserunners on, but then the defense held to shut them off. Tim Mead was Andover's pitcher who registered 8 hits and 5 walks.

After defeating Jasper, Andover earned the right to play Angelica in the quarter-final game. Previously, Angelica won their division with 9 wins and 1 loss, but this didn't seem to affect the Panthers as they came up on top 5 to 4. Andover collected 9 base-hits from supposedly the biggest ace in the North Division, Kirk Spangler. With this victory, Andover could well be on their way.

While the Andover Panthers were winning, Belmont and Scio who placed ahead of them in League play, were defeated and were eliminated from play in Section V.

Andover now was being called the Cinderella Team, as they now were to play Bradford in the semi-final game at Hornell. The Panthers were ahead 1 to 0 until the Fourth Inning, then Bradford scored one run to tie it until the bottom of the Sixth Inning when Bradford scored one more run and then the Panthers retaliated in the top of the Seventh with the score 2 to 2. But, to the disappointment of Andover, errors beat them again, as Bradford scored two runs in the bottom of the Seventh to win 4 to 2.

The Baseball Squad has nothing to be ashamed of as they went to the semi-finals and advanced farther than any ball club from Andover has since Andover won Section V in 1958-1959. With only two seniors graduating, Bill Cornell and Shawn McCormick, the team proves to be a winner next year and maybe the sectional trophy will be in Andover in '76.

The team batting average was .196 and the personal averages for the starting lineup were: Rex Vosburg .103 — Bill Cornell .125 — Tim Mead .159 — Rob Hyland .184 — Jay MacMichael .195 — Steve Scott .265 — Dale Russell .255 — Monty Geer .257 — and Gary Barden with the highest average of .285.

Andover should be proud of the athletic program at the school and maybe now the village and town residents might realize how important athletics are, as this team didn't give up and outdid many other teams in both AHS and Stouben Leagues.

## Alfred Historical Society To Receive \$5,000 Grant

Parks and Recreation Commissioner Orin Lehman has announced that a grant of \$5,000 to the Alfred Historical Society has been approved by the National Park Service. The funds will assist the Historical Society in developing the "Terra Cotta" as a museum of Alfred ceramics.

This building, constructed of tiles, bricks and ornamental plaques manufactured by the Celadon Terra Cotta Company, was built in 1892 to serve as the company office and display of their products. The "Terra Cotta" is the only company structure which survived the fire which destroyed the

## Veteran News

**"RETURN IN A SAFE PLACE"** is the motto of the American Legion. It is the goal of the Legion to help the returning soldier, sailor, airman and marine to find a safe place to live and work. This is done by providing them with financial aid, job training, and other services.

**ON-JOB AND APPRENTICESHIP TRAINING** — An active veteran (having on the job or apprenticeship training) is entitled to monthly financial assistance while enrolled in an approved training program. During the first six months of training the veteran receives \$100 monthly, in addition to the wages paid by the employer, if he is single; \$200 monthly if he has one dependent; \$300 monthly if he has two dependents; and \$400 monthly if he has three or more dependents. As the training period progresses and the veteran's salary increases, these amounts are decreased proportionately. To be eligible, the veteran must have served 181 days or more with the Armed Forces since January 31, 1945 and have been released or discharged under honorable conditions. A wide variety of jobs are available through apprenticeship and on-the-job training programs with many openings in the various trades waiting for qualified veterans. There is a heading, however, for those who wish to train under the program. Eligibility generally ceases ten years from the date of the veteran's release from service or August 30, 1977, whichever is the later. Veterans considering the job or apprenticeship training should contact the local counseling center of the New York State Division of Veterans Affairs located at the Municipal Bldg., Westville, N. Y., on Tuesdays, and at the City Building, 118 Broadway, Hornell, N. Y., on Mondays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays.

rest of the plant in 1900. It was nominated and placed on the National Register of Historical Places in 1971.

The success of the Celadon Terra Cotta Company was largely responsible for locating the New York School of Clayworking in Alfred and the building, now temporarily located on Main Street in Alfred, will be re-located in the courtyard of the new complex of the State College of Ceramics.

The Alfred Historical Society will assume \$9,718.83 of the development cost for installation of heating, plumbing and electrical systems, restoration of the fireplace, painting and tile and brick work.
