Happy Birthday America

Mrs. Ruth Hitchcock of Wilmington, Delaware, has completely handmade an unusual birthday present for America's 200th Birthday. The present, a quilt, represents 2 1/2 years or 2200 hours of stitching and research with approximately 400,000 hand quilting stitches. The stitching pattern, adapted from a 1799 quilt, is on a background of continental blue with the first seals of the original 13 states, plus two other ones of the original United States seals and another of the Liberty Bell, thus having 15 white squares quilted and embroidered.

Mrs. Hitchcock began each seal's research with a visit to the office of the Secretary of State of each state, then into archives and museums. She completed the quilt with each seal exactly duplicated in pattern and color.

This double-bed-size quilt has been appraised at \$22,000, because of its historical significance. In no other single place can the 13 original state seals be found in color except on this beautiful quilt. No commercial profit can be made of this quilt, nor can it be sold.

She is still going to visit the governors of the 13 States who are in office 1975-1976, the Bicentennial year. Also she is going to New York City in August to Good Housekeeping to do an article on the quilt which maybe a picture of it and the article will appear in the spring issue. Also there is a possibility that she might be on the (To-Day) TV Show sometime this year. In August she may put the quilt at the Smithsonian at Washington, D. C.

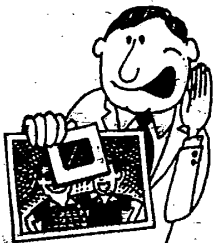
Best man was Leslie Monahan, the groom's brother.
