The American Legion Band will play a concert in the evening, which will be followed by dancing.

Andover Firemen, Legion and local individuals have been helping people in Hornell that were hit with the flood last week. Water, food, bedding and clothing have been trucked there to help the homeless. The gas company helped lay a line from McClusky Pond to the City. Oliver Kemp trucked a load of 54 cans of water to Hornell, Saturday, where it was distributed. When the people found out that the drinking water had to be boiled, they took the load in short time.

Fred Potter was chosen President of the Southwestern Firemen's Association held in Andover last week, held at the Lyric Theatre. About 200 County Firemen attended the banquet Wednesday evening at the IOOF Hall, served by Andover Firemen ladies. Al Sigl, popular radio announcer from WHAM, Rochester, gave a fine address.
