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## Senator BUCKLEY

What effect would the fall of South Vietnam have on our relations with our allies around the world? N. B.-

Many governments, particularly in Southeast Asia, are beginning to reassess their relationships with the United States. Thailand, for example, has already asked us to remove our air bases within a pear. The Philippines, where we have important military bases, have indicated that they may assure a postal activities in the area. that they may assume a neutral posture in the area. The Innance who in the nast have relied for their security on the United States, are now reported to be reassessing the reliability of American commitments to their security, and also to be deciding whether or n't to develop their own nuclear weapons. Even in Europe, such prestigious publications as I ondon's Economist are now questioning the denth of America's resolve to participate in the de-fense of Furone. Such a situation makes it all the more important for the United States to honor its present commitments in Southeast Asia and the Middle East.

Would you support a proposal that the Consumer Product Safety Commission rootrict the sale or manufacture of firearms or ammunition? G. S.—Plattsburgh

I have consistently supported tough, mandatory jail sentences for those caught in possession of firearms while committing a crime But I have never supported sweening our control of the kind contemplated by those seeking to accomplish through the Consumer Product Safety Commission what they have never been able to accomplish through their democratically elected repre-sentatives sufficient lail sentences, with no l'opholes, are the only way we will induce would-be robbers and muggers to leave their hardware home.

What conditions would you place on Cuba for a resumption of diplomatic and economic relations?

Two barriers to more normal relations come to mind immediately. First, the Soviet Union has long been using Cuba as a base of operations for exporting such acts of subversion as guerilla Insurrections and political kidnappings to other Latin American countries. Second, the resource in a subversion as a clentuegos, construct of with Soviet help, provides the Soviets with the solidity to expend their submaring presence in the Western Atlantic gand their submarine presence in the Western Atlantic on very short notice. Before we grant Cuba the economic advantages that come with more normal relations, should require that they expel Soviet intelligence opera-tives, and deny the use of Cuban territorial waters and basing facilities to the Soviet Navy.
