

## GREENWOOD NEWS

Hollands Lumber Co., Inc., of Hornell was the apparent low bidder for General Construction on a renovation project at Greenwood Central School. Bids were opened by the Board of Education last week and the Hollands bid was \$55,676. Other general construction bids were submitted by L. C. Whitford Co. Inc., of Wellsville \$69,400; C. Pfeil Lumber \$64,419 and Camento Inc., of Montour Falls \$60,680.

Hoagg Nichols of Horseheads with a bid of \$42,486 was the apparent low bidder for the Mechanical Contract. Other bids submitted were J. Z. Kennedy Plumbing and Heating \$48,929; Ken Trisselli Plumbing and Heating of Corning \$48,516; Ernest Wayand of Hornell \$48,536; Kimble Plumbing and Heating of Elmira \$43,000 and Kenneth Kemp Plumbing and Heating of Hornell \$56,411. Only two bids were received for the Electrical Contract and Angelo Colano of Arkport submitted the apparent low bid of \$35,500. The other bid was \$47,410 submitted by Crum Electric of Elmira. The Board did not take action on the bids until word was received from the State Department of Education concerning building aid.

Principal Gary Moore said work is to start as soon as possible. This Spring the voters in the District approved expenditures up to \$160,000 for building renovation and repairs. The bids as expected to be awarded total \$133,662. Even with legal fees and architect fees we are within our limits Mr. Moore said. At first it was felt some of the proposed work could not be included, but the alternatives such as re-surfacing the tennis courts and a new Gym floor can be included in the program as bid. The project in addition to the new floor for the Gym and the tennis courts work will include new aluminum windows for part of the school, a new heat control system, installation of exhaust fans in the Gym ceiling, new fixtures in four toilet rooms, complete rewiring of the building and new sound clock and fire alarm systems. The school is also building a new walk on Main Street.
